The new law requiring practitioners of medicine and surgery to take their diplomas to the Prothonotary of their counties to be registered has been signed by the Governor and has gone into effect, and the penalty for refusing to comply with this law is a fine of one hundred dollars, one-half to go to the prosecutor and the other half to the county, with imprisonment in the county jail at the discretion of the Court. This is one of the methods by which it is proposed to weed out diplomas.
