### The News Condensed.

President Garfield's mother is very sick at Cincinnati.

Subscriptions to the Garfield fund have reached \$647,600.

The President's mother is reported seriously ill in Cleveland.

Ingatjeff has finally induced the Czar to commute the death sentence of Hessa Helfmann.

The yield of crops in Oregon, it is reported, will be thirty to forty per cent. larger than last year.

Twenty buildings were destroyed by fire at Bradford on Friday, including the U. S. Express office and two hotels.

An Astronomical Congress will be held at Strasburg in September, and the leading astronomers of Europe and America are expected to attend.

By proclamation of the Governors of Arkansas and Kentucky, Thursday was observed in those states as a day of fasting and prayer for the President's recovery.

From official July estimates of the Boards of Agriculture of Ohio, Illinois, Michigan and Iowa, the shortage in wheat compared with 1880 is: Ohio 12,000,000 bushels, Illinois 37,000,000, Michigan 14,250,000 bushels, and Iowa 17,000,000 bushels.

### THE DEAD-LOCK BROKEN.

## THE PRESIDENT GETTING WELL.

The following dispatch was sent by the President's surgeons to the consulting surgeons at 8 o'clock last evening: Since our dispatch of yesterday, the President has done as well as our hopes then indicated. He has had a single hypodermic injection of an eighth of an grain of sulphate of morphia (at bed time) and slept well. Quinia in three grain doses has been continued, as has the plan of nourishment hitherto reported. His bowels have been kept free by enemas. The wound is dressed with antiseptic precautions, twice daily. There is now a free discharge of healthy pus. The afternoon fever both yesterday and to-day has been comparatively light.
