MURRAY ENNIS died at his residence in this borough on Tuesday. He had suffered from consumption for a good many years.—His age was about 40 years. Funeral this morning at 10, and the body will afterwards be taken to Standing Stone for burial.

Mrs. HENRIETTA FANNING died of apoplexy in this place Tuesday evening. She was apparently well until about 6 o'clock, p. m., when she suddenly became unconscious

and lived only five hours. The deceased was 65 years old. She was the mother of T. M. BONFOEY, an engineer on the S. L. & S. R. R., and the grandmother of Dr. S. C. ROSS.—Funeral services will be conducted at the house, near the graded school building, this morning at 10 o'clock, after which the remains will be taken to Leona for interment.

As one sister and her husband were dead, Jas. H. CODDING, (a nephew), and wife were invited to make the number good. It was also the anniversary of Dr. CODDING'S birthday. The hostess had prepared a bountiful feast and the family united for the first time in years, spent one of the most enjoyable days of their lives. Col. J. A. CODDING and J. H. CODDING and their wives were present, and drove home in the evening.

Under date of July 19, a correspondent writes from Corning, N. Y., to the Elmira Advertiser as follows:

Mr. Oscar Saunders, one of the best known and most highly respected citizens of this place, for many years connected with the hardware firm of Walker & Latirop, as foreman in their tinning department, met with an accident to-day which was truly a providential escape from sudden death. He had proceeded to the new residence of Mr. James Hoare, now building on First street, to take some measurements of the roof, and as he commenced his ascent through an opening about four feet square, left for the stairway, he safely reached the third floor, when with a short ladder he sought to gain the roof. The ladder slipped and he fell back through the opening, his body and shoulders striking the edge of each opening as he passed through. Mr. Hoare was standing on the first floor as he shot by him through the cellar-way to the ground below, head first. When within about three feet of the cellar bottom, his shoulders struck upon a plank, which was resting from it to the first floor, and rebounded some three feet, when he fell to the bottom, having fallen altogether a distance of some forty feet. Mr. Hoare at once summoned aid and Mr. Hiram Pritchard with his conveyance took him to his residence on Third street. Dr. T. A. Mills was summoned and found him in a critical condition, insensible from the fearful shock which he had sustained. An examination being made it was found that no bones were broken, and Dr. Mills stated that his injuries would in all probabilities not prove fatal.

Mr. SAUNDERS is a son-in-law of T. P. PATCH, of this place and at one time lived here.

Six persons who escaped death at the New Ulm cyclone have become insane. The death list is enlarging.

Col. Henry Warner James, U. S. A., attempted suicide at Hudson, N. Y., with a sword cane. He has been subject to fits of insanity.

The Pope has appointed Rev. W. M. Wigger, Bishop of Newark, and Rev. M. J. O'Farrell, pastor of St. Peters church of New York, first Bishop of Trenton.

A convention of county officers of this State has been in session in Williamsport this week. The attendance was not large. Bradford was not represented.

James Bridger, a companion of Fremont, after whom Fort Bridger was

named, and the first white man to follow the Santa Fe trail across the plains is dead, aged 76.

It has been decided at the Treasury Department that journalists can bring certain books for their libraries into the United States free of duty. It is understood that this decision is based on the clause in the revised statutes admitting "tools of trade" free of duty.
