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Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Republican County Committee in session Friday June 24, 1881, the Convention of the Republican party for 1881 will convene at the COURT HOUSE in TOWANDA BOROUGH on TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, at ONE O'CLOCK, P. M., to make the following nominations for county officers, to wit:

- One person for Sheriff.
- One person for Prothonotary, &c.
- One person for Register and Recorder, &c.
- One person for Treasurer.
- Two persons for County Commissioners.
- Two persons for County Auditors.

And for the transaction of any other business that may come before the convention.

The Committees of Vigilance of the several election districts will call primary meetings at the usual places of holding Delegate elections for their respective districts, for SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3D., 1881, to elect by BALLOT two delegates to represent each district in said county convention.

The delegate elections in the BOROUGHS will be organized at SIX O'CLOCK, P. M., and be kept open continuously, to close at 8 o'clock, p. m. In the districts of Barclay, North Towanda and Athens District No. 3, from FIVE O'CLOCK, P. M., continuously until 7 o'clock p. m., at which time they shall close. And in all other townships from THREE o'clock, p. m., continuously until FIVE o'clock, p. m., at which time they shall close. The votes shall then be counted and the result certified by the proper officers of said meetings to the Chairman of said Convention and a copy delivered at once to the delegates elect.

The Committees of Vigilance are particularly requested to give at least three weeks' written or printed notice of the said primary elections, and to carefully observe the above rules in conducting the said primary meetings.

Only Republicans can participate in said meetings.

The Pennsylvania iron market has gained strength during the past week in every department. Prices are slightly firmer, and concessions are no longer asked, promptness in delivery being the chief consideration. Inquiries are now no e numerous and buyers have been ordering more freely. The pig imports have increased and negotiations are still pending for large quantities of surplus foreign stock to take the place of supplies which are now reduced. The rolling mills are now booking orders rapidly, and consumers generally act as though the lowest prices had been reached. Bridge, ship, car and boiler iron orders come in rapidly. Plate mills are unusually active and heavy orders at advanced rates were placed last week. Heavy orders for steel and iron rails are in the market for both fall and spring delivery, but the terms are not fixed. Manufacturers say that by the opening of winter 500,000 tons of next year's output will be contracted for.

The twenty-second annual session of the Junior O. U. A. M. met in Philadelphia Friday morning and 130 representatives were present. George B. Hight, of Altoona, State Councilor, presided, assisted by L. V. C. G. H. Arthur, of Philadelphia. Resolutions were adopted condemning Guitau, the President's assailant, and sympathizing with President Garfield. The report of the State officers shows the finances as follows: Amount received during the year, \$3,056.97; benefits paid, \$6,904.49; amount in treasury of subordinate lodges, \$63,210.48. The order in Pennsylvania numbers 6657 members. Delegates from the State to National council were instructed to vote against changing name of the order should that question arise. The report of the committee appointed to revise constitution and by-laws was received and laid over for one year. After placing in nomination candidates for election to serve during the ensuing year the council adjourned.

The most important developments that have as yet been made by the government in investigation of Star route frauds came to light in Philadelphia yesterday when Thomas McDevitt and LeGrand Ensign were taken in custody. These men arranged and executed a plan of defrauding the government by raising the prices of carrying mails on routes in the far West, in all of which the increased price was authorized by ex-Assistant Postmaster General Brady. The principal in the matter is believed to be McDevitt, against whom there is said to be strong testimony. Both prisoners were arraigned before United States Commissioner Gibbons in the afternoon and committed in default of \$5,000 bail each for further hearing Thursday next.

Mrs. James, the wife of the Postmaster General, had intended to go to Europe this year, but owing to the attack upon the President her plans, as well as those of the wives of the other Cabinet officers have been changed. She will defer her journey until next summer. Mrs. Blaine is still in Washington, and so is

Mrs. MacVeagh, who is much praised for her helpfulness at the time of the shooting. When the news reached her she hurried to the White House and had everything ready for the reception of the wounded man when the ambulance arrived with him.

A dispatch from Las Vegas, N. M. says that the jury on the body of "Billy the Kid" returned a verdict of justifiable homicide, coupled with a statement that Pat Garrett deserved the thanks of the whole community for ridding the country of the desperado. The Kid was a beardless youth of 21 years and was born in New York. His boast was that he had killed a man for every year of his age which is probably true. Sheriff Garrett received the reward of \$500 from the territory, and \$200 will be raised for him by the rejoicing people.

The steamer City of Winnipeg was burned Friday morning at her dock in Duluth. She is a total loss. All the passengers were saved, but four of her crew are missing.
