### THE PRESIDENT STEADILY IMPROVING.

The following bulletin was sent by the attending to the consulting surgeons at eight o'clock last evening: "The President slept well last night and has been easy during the day. At the morning dressing the wound, which is looking very well, discharged several ounces of healthy pus. A little solid fragment, that floated out with the discharge, proved to consist of a thin scale of bone about an eighth of an inch in length, with a morsel of sloughing fibrous tissue and a number of adhering fibers of cotton and wool. He continues to take and digest a reasonable quantity of nourishment. The evening hypodermic injection of sulphate of morphia and quinia has been continued.

## The News Condensed.

The army worm is making terrible havoc in the oat fields of Iowa

One hundred and fifty coal miners struck for higher wages at Pittston on Thursday.

Robert S. Bartlet an old and highly esteemed citizen of Binghamton, died on Thursday morning, aged 73.

Amia Stout, a female smoker of Buffalo, N. Y., put a lighted cigar in her pocket and was nearly burned to death.

The net earnings of the Reading Railroad Coal and Iron Companies for the year ending June 30th, was \$4,688,000 and increase of \$688,000.

A rock-slide occurred in a quarry near Slatington, Thursday. Two laborers were crushed to death and shockingly mutilated. A number of others barely escaped.

A circus was broken up by a mob in Pottsville, Wednesday night. About a dozen shots were fired outside of the tent and volleys of stones were hurled against it. A boy was shot in the shoulder, a man struck on the head with a club, and two circus men badly wounded.
