**MYSTERIOUS KNOCKINGS.**—The family of JAS. H. PHINNEY have been very much annoyed and considerably frightened the last two or three nights by unaccountable and mysterious doings at their residence corner of Third and Bridge streets. Night before last—Tuesday, between 8 and 10 o'clock they heard a knock at the door, and on answering it no one was found at the door, but immediately another knock was heard at the next door, and so on all around, and on going to the door every time there was no one there. Last evening—Wednesday, the performance was repeated, and a large cobble stone was thrown through the window into the house. Officers MOFFIT and JOHNSON WELLES were called, but did not succeed in capturing the offender, although he made himself heard while they were there. Whoever he is, he is very agile in his movements, being able to knock at the door and get off the steps before he can be seen or caught. It is certainly a very mysterious affair, and what it means or what the motive of this person can be, Mr. PHINNEY and his family are utterly at a loss to know. We understand other families in the vicinity have been annoyed in the same way, and probably by the same person. Stones have been thrown through the windows of Mr. ROACHE'S house, who lives near by, several times.—*Journal.*

To the end that none of our numerous readers in this borough may plead ignorance of the law, we re-publish the new dog ordinance with the suggestion that the borough authorities are in "dead earnest," and will see to it that the law is enforced. "A word to the wise is sufficient":

**ORDINANCE.**

At a special meeting of the Council held July 11, 1881, at which all the members were present except Councilmen McCabe and Rahm, the ordinance passed July 12th, 1880, was amended as follows: Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Towanda, and it is ordained by the authority of the same, that the ordinance passed July 12, 1880, in relation to dogs running on the streets of the Borough, be amended as follows: "That from the first day of June to the 30th day of September of each year it shall not be lawful for dogs to be upon the streets within the Borough limits, without a muzzle, either with or without its owner; and it shall be the duty of the Pound Master to seize, or cause to be seized, all dogs so running at large and impound them in a secure pound, and unless the owner, or owners of dogs so seized and impounded shall pay or cause to be paid to the Pound Master the sum of one dollar for the redemption of his or her dog within twenty-four hours from the time of such seizure it shall be the duty of the Pound Master to kill all such unclaimed dogs. Any ordinance inconsistent herewith is hereby repealed. Under the provisions of the above ordinance yesterday was the last day of grace for unmuzzled dogs, and JOHN CARTER will keep a sharp look-out and see that the law is enforced without respect to persons.
