The funeral of Mr. S. EASTBROOK, whose death was announced in Monday's Review, took place in Elmira Tuesday afternoon, after which the remains were taken to Troy for interment. Rev. J. S. STEWART, D. D., of this place, conducted the religious services. The illness which resulted in the death of Mr. E. was very brief. He was attacked with cholera morbus on Tuesday evening of last week and died on Sunday.

The Rev. Dr. CRAFT, of Wyatusing, Pa., occupied the pulpit of the First Presbyterian church yesterday morning and evening. Both of his sermons were of an essentially gospel character, thoroughly permeated with the essence and the spirit of Christianity. In the evening his discourse was founded on the words in Deuteronomy, xxxii, 31: "For their rock is not our rock, even our enemies themselves being judges." The point aimed at and reached was the beauty and excellence of the Christian religion, and testified to by its enemies. It was shown by a series of illustrations and arguments that were apt and convincing, and uttered in sincere and positive manner. The large attendance at both services manifested by their attention and evident interest that the sermons were pleasing.—*Elmira Free Press.*

FRANK RIENBURG was drawing grain near Litchfield, Pa., yesterday (Monday), afternoon, and in order to get to the barn where he was taking his loads, had to pass through a gateway around which a number of school girls were playing, among them a little twelve years old daughter of CHRIS HARRIS, of Litchfield, a bright little creature and very popular with her playmates. RIENBURG spoke to the girls when he was going through the gateway, telling them to keep away or they might get hurt. On one trip after he had opened the gate, he climbed back on his load and had only just started his team to proceed when he heard a scream and instantly stopped. He got down to see what was the matter and looking under the wagon saw the little HARRIS girl lying on the ground. One of the wheels had passed over her body. She lived only five minutes after the accident.

How she got where she was can only be a matter of conjecture.—*Elmira Free Press.*

The law now requires the attendance of all officers and men unless excused by the Brigade Commander for such reasons only as would prevail in actual service.
