PROCEEDINGS IN COURT ON THE ANNOUNCEMENT OF WARNER H. CARNOCHAN'S DEATH.—On the first day of Argument Court, July 11, it being the first session since the death of WARNER HAYDEN CARNOCHAN Esq., a member of the bar of this county, on motion of D'A. OVERTON, Esq., his Honor Judge MORROW appointed O. D. KINNEY, Hon. DELOS ROCKWELL and JOHN F. SANDERSON, Esq., a committee to present resolutions expressive of the sense of the court and bar at the great loss sustained, and directed that the report be considered on Wednesday July 13 at 4 o'clock, p. m. At the appointed time the committee presented the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted after appropriate eulogies by Judge MORROW, Senator DAVIES, D'A. OVERTON, H. N. WILLIAMS, ex-Senator ROCKWELL, R. A. MERCUR, WM. FOYLE, Hon. B. S. BENTLY, of Williamsport, and O. D. KINNEY. The addresses all bore eloquent testimony to the personal worth and professional ability of Mr. CARNOCHAN:

WHEREAS, Warner H. Carnochan, an honored member of this Bar, after a protracted struggle with that insidious disease consumption, repelling it for a time by the exercise of his strong will, departed this life on the 17th day of June, A. D., 1881.

WHEREAS, So great a loss to the profession in which he ranked among the first; to the community as a citizen; of which he possessed the esteem and confidence; to the public generally, of which he was prominently a representative man; deserves a befitting and appropriate recognition. Therefore,

Resolved, That we bear evidence to his great ability, as a lawyer; the sterling integrity that characterized his every act, professional and other; the uniform courtesy and kind treatment which we have ever received from him; and the fidelity and ability with which he guarded each and every interest of his clients.

Resolved, That the people of Bradford county have lost by his death, a citizen who by reason of the great diversity of his knowledge of questions with which their interests were identified, was specially fitted to ably fill and honor any position to which they or the people of the commonwealth might call him.

Resolved, That to his family, who by his death have been bereft of a husband and father, who by his great loving nature made his home an epitome of that higher life to which he has gone, we extend our heartfelt sympathy.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be entered upon the records of this Court, and also that a copy of the same, attested by the Court be furnished to the family.

In the Topeka, Kan., State Capitol of July 20th we find the following notice of an interesting event in the life of a former prominent and highly esteemed citizen of this county. The many friends in Bradford of Judge THOMAS will heartily congratulate him in the attainment of so many years, and especially that he is esteemed worthy of such marks of respect by the people among whom he has lived for the past twenty-five years:

The residence of Hon. Chester Thomas, sr., police judge of this city, was taken by storm, Monday evening by a large party of ladies and gentlemen. The Judge was seventy-one years old yesterday and his friends and relatives determined to give him a genuine surprise party in honor of the event. At nine o'clock a reporter of the Capital found the Judge's residence and grounds brilliantly lighted and in full possession of a large company engaged in congratulating the Judge on the attainment of his seventy-first birthday, and wishing many continued years of happiness and prosperity. All seemed to enjoy themselves hugely and a cordial spirit of hearty congratulation ruled the hour.

Judge Thomas recited to some of the older members of the company many of the interesting incidents of his long and eventful life, and recalled the fact that his life covered a period which marked the commencement of nearly all the important events connected with the marvelous progress of the present century. He called to mind most of the important political movements of the last fifty years, and altogether the conversation was full of interesting reminiscences of the last half century.

Among those present we noticed Hon. M. H. Case and wife, Hon. Thos. Ryan and wife, Hon. Sidney Clarke, Col. L. F. Eggers, Dr. Roby, Hon. Chester Thomas, jr., wife and daughter, Mrs. D. M. Adams and daughters, A. S. Thomas and wife, Chas. N. Rix, Mrs. J. E. Ward of Towanda, Pa., Romeo Wood-

ford and Mrs. Woodford, Mr. McComb and family, Frank S. Thomas, Mr. Cullen, of Junction City, Mrs. J. B. Thomas, and Rev. R. F. Markham.

The presents received were numerous and valuable. A large easy chair, presented by Misses Ryan and Case was a most appropriate gift, besides a large number of other articles we did not have a chance to enumerate. Refreshments were served at 10 o'clock, and it was not till a late hour that all the company had departed, each leaving with the Judge and Mrs. Thomas their best wishes for many years of life and happiness.
