The following particulars of a reported outrage in the Adirondacks, will be read with interest by our readers from the fact the heroic lady mentioned is the wife of a former Towandian. Mr. Bull was born and lived here untill he was grown to manhood. His father was the late Col. JAS. P. BULL. The Senator refurred to is not ex-Senator Platt of New York, but Senator PLATT a brotherin-law of Mr. Bull, who also lived here at one time and was associated with Gen. HOYT, in the management of the old Towarda Academy. The account is taken from the Philadelphia Press of Friday:

Chairman George Bull of the Democratic city executive committee and a prominent member of the Philadelphia bar was seated at member of the Philadelphia bar was seated at breakfast yesterday morning in the Girard House perusing a newspaper at the same time, when his eye fell up m a paragraph which caused his cheek to turn pale and his blood to almost curdle in his veins. It was a dispatch from Troy, New York, stating that Charles Parker, a guide in the Adirondacks at Blue Mountain Lake, while guiding Mrs. George Bull, the day previous, from Forked Lake to Long Lake, where she was to have been the guest of ex-Senator Platt, had committed an guest of ex-Senator Platt, had committed an outrageous assault upon her, almost strangling her and and tearing her clotnes to pieces in the struggle. Mr. Bull knew that the lady referred to was his wife, who was visiting in that locality, and for an instant he nearly fainted. Chief Clerk John E. Wilson happened fortunately to act hand and Mr. It. pened fortunately to be at hand and Mr. Bul was assisted to his own room, where he rewas assisted to his own room, Where he received the sympathy of his many friends who had learned of the terrible occurrence from the newspapers. The unfortunate husband was entreated to keep up his heart, and was repeatedly assured that the news must be exaggerated. While deeply sensible of the devotedness of his many warm friends, Mr. Bull was naturally placed in such a position that he could not remain calm. He bore himself bravely for a time, but soon broke down and his only desire seemed to get where he could obtain reliable intelligence of his wife's condition. Accordingly he took the limited condition. Accordingly he took the limited express train at 1.30 for New York, intending to go from there directly to the scene of the assault in the Adirondack Mountains and rejoin his wife as soon as possible. A number of sympathizing companions accompanied Mr. Bull to the depot, and each one expressed the fervent hope that he would find his wife safe and uninjured. Last evening he sent the following dispatch from New York to Mr. Wilson at the Girard House:

A dispatch from Holland says she is all right.— Will wait here till to-morrow. Mr. Wilson said to a *Press* reporter last night, "I feel sure that the despatch in the morning papers was greatly overstated. Mrs Bull was a strong, plucky little woman, and I am sure that no bodily harm has come to her except, perhaps, a few scratches from her struggle with the villian. About two months ago Mr. and Mrs. Bull gave up house-keeping in West Philadelphia and came to board at this hotel. Mrs. Bull was a lively, well-spoken lady, and speedily became a great favorite with the other boarders in the house. She is of medium height, and yery prepossessing and attractive in her appearance. A week ago she left home for the Adirondacks, and Mr. Bull intended to follow her as soon as he could arrange his business. Mrs. Bull was accompanied by her mail servant, who was capable of affording her ample protection. On Tuesday Mr. Bull received a dispatch frem his wife, saying that she had met with an accident, but without stating the nature of it. That worried her husband a great deal, and when he saw the news in the papers he was completely upset.
