The News Condensed.

The President's Condition.

OFFICIAL BULLETIN.

AUGUST 4, 7 P. M.

As the morning bulletin indicated would probably be the case, the President has passed another good day, without drawback or unpleasant symptom of any kind. He has taken nourishment well, and shown little fatigue after his dressing and changes of position. The wound is doing well both in appearance, character and amount of the discharge. At 12:30 p. m. his pulse was 96, temperature 98.4, respiration 18. The afternoon rise of temperature came on late, and was moderate in degree. At 7 p. m. his pulse was 102, temperature 100.2, respiration 19.
