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Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Republican County Committee in session Friday June 24, 1881, the Convention of the Republican party for 1881 will convene at the COURT HOUSE in TOWANDA BOROUGH on TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, at ONE O'CLOCK, P. M., to make the following nominations for county officers, to wit:

- One person for Sheriff.
- One person for Prothonotary, &c.
- One person for Register and Recorder, &c.
- One person for Treasurer.
- Two persons for County Commissioners.
- Two persons for County Auditors.

And for the transaction of any other business that may come before the convention.

The Committees of Vigilance of the several election districts will call primary meetings at the usual places of holding Delegate elections for their respective districts, for SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3D., 1881, to elect by BALLOT two delegates to represent each district in said county convention.

The delegate elections in the BOROUGHs will be organized at SIX O'CLOCK, P. M., and be kept open continuously, to close at 8 o'clock, p. m. In the districts of Barclay, North Towanda and Athens District No. 3, from FIVE O'CLOCK, P. M., continuously until 7 o'clock p. m., at which time they shall close. And in all other townships from THREE o'clock, p. m., continuously until FIVE o'clock, p. m., at which time they shall close. The votes shall then be counted and the result certified by the proper officers of said meetings to the Chairman of said Convention and a copy delivered at once to the delegates elect.

The Committees of Vigilance are particularly requested to give at least three weeks' written or printed notice of the said primary elections, end to carefully observe the above rules in conducting the said primary meetings.

Only Republicans can participate in said meetings.

Keep out of office. Thousands of men have their eyes turned to some lucrative position. They are tired of earning their living in customary ways and yearn for the fleshpots of office. Of these thousands, nine-tenths are doomed to disappointment; but, after all, is it not for their good? Of all occupations, office-holding is the most precarious and the least satisfactory. To be at the mercy, at the whim or caprice of a politician himself a creature of a superior, is to be in purgatory. But few offices pay well. The work as a rule is not hard, lazy habits are engendered, dissimulation and treachery are apt to be developed, sturdy independence is undertoned and un-American ideas are sown in fallow soil. To professional politicians the life of an office-holder has charms. To men at the top of the ladder come power and influence; but to the ordinary, dependent subordinate there is a wearing restlessness which is burdened often with disappointment and is never free from uncertainty and apprehension. Unless a man gives an honest day's work, and the fact is that quite one-half of the office-holders of today do very little labor, and that grudgingly.

A Harrisburg dispatch prophecies thusly: "A month or two ago there was every indication that the coming Convention would be equally as stormy as the last Republican State Convention held here was, at which the fatal stab was given to the third term business by one-half of the Convention refusing to be bound by the instructions to support Grant as a unit at Chicago; but Guiteau's bullet has effected such wonderful results in harmonizing Pennsylvania politicians that on the night proceeding this Republican Convention the Cameron lion, the troublesome Wolfe, from the rugged forests of Union, and the lamblike Quay will lie down together, and the next morning will walk up the hill to the convention, nominate Senator Davies of Bradford, for State Treasurer, appoint Col. A. Loudon Snowden, of Philadelphia, Chairman of the State Committee, walk down the hill again, accept Senator Cameron's invitation to test the quality of his wines, and then go home happy."

There are physicians who, through interviews with reporters, or, still more openly in the public press over their own signatures, have condemned the medical treatment to which Mr. Garfield has been subjected. The doctors in charge, however, have this to their credit, that their patient seems, in their hands, to be progressing toward recovery. If there is any fault of omission or commission in their management of the case that is palpable, unequivocal or patent to professional intelligence, it might be prudent and proper to point attention to the error. But the criticism bestowed on the attendant physicians has been vague and uncertain, dealing mostly with generalities. Under the circumstances it would be wise to refrain from embarrassing the doctors by forcing a discussion of medical systems into the public press.

The only significance in the Kentucky election is that politics are very dull in

that State. Without much effort on either side and an unusual light vote, the Democrats managed to show about their customary majority. The legislature just chosen is strongly in favor of the reelection of Mr. Beck to the U. S. Senate. Mr. Beck is a valuable member of that body. He has outgrown much of the extreme partisanship he used to display when in the House of Representatives, and ranks among the most intelligent, industrious and fair-minded of the Democratic Senators. He is much more useful to his State and to the country than any man would be likely to prove whom Kentucky would send in his place if he were pushed aside, and we are glad his return is assured.
