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## Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Republican County Committee in session Friday June 24, 1881, the Convention of the Republican party for 1881 will convene at the COURT HOUSE in TOWANDA BOROUGH on TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, at ONE O'CLOCK, P. M., to make the following nominations for county officers, to wit:

- One person for Sheriff.
- One person for Prothonotary, &c.
- One person for Register and Recorder, &c.
- One person for Treasurer.
- Two persons for County Commissioners.
- Two persons for County Auditors.

And for the transaction of any other business that may come before the convention.

The Committees of Vigilance of the several election districts will call primary meetings at the usual places of holding Delegate elections for their respective districts, for SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3D., 1881, to elect by BALLOT two delegates to represent each district in said county convention.

The delegate elections in the BOROUGHs will be organized at SIX O'CLOCK, P. M., and be kept open continuously, to close at 8 o'clock, p. m. in the districts of Barclay, North Towanda and Athens District No. 3, from FIVE O'CLOCK, P. M., continuously until 7 o'clock p. m., at which time they shall close. And in all other townships from THREE o'clock, p. m., continuously until FIVE o'clock, p. m., at which time they shall close. The votes shall then be counted and the result certified by the proper officers of said meetings to the Chairman of said Convention and a copy delivered at once to the delegates elect.

The Committees of Vigilance are particularly requested to give at least three weeks' written or printed notice of the said primary elections, and to carefully observe the above rules in conducting the said primary meetings.

Only Republicans can participate in said meetings.

There has been much fault found with the action of the Post office authorities of late in cutting down the allowances for clerk-hire in many of the offices. It has been found upon investigation that many offices were highly favored, and that by the use of superior influences these offices had secured more than their fair proportion of allowances, as based upon the gross receipts of the office by law. Thus a case in point is cited of two towns in New York State. One showed gross receipts to the amount of \$7,200 and was allowed \$300 for clerical hire and nothing for rent. Another town of about the same size showed \$5,200 gross receipts and was allowed \$700 for rent and \$700 for clerk hire. These great discrepancies show that the law requiring the allowances to be gauged by the gross receipts has not been adhered to. As soon as this state of things was ascertained the Department took the matter in hand and proceeded to rectify it. A large number of towns that were in excess of their allowances were cut down. Post Offices in Pennsylvania were cut down as follows: Cory, \$431; Lock Haven, \$95; Pottsville, \$161; Towanda, \$19; Warren, \$275. The Department is also looking carefully after offices whose gross receipts have not justified the allowances which their needs evidently demanded, and they will be cared for. Such an office is Ogden, Utah. Chicago also complains of a lack of sufficient clerical help, and a commissioner will leave next week to inquire into her actual wants.

The Second Assistant Postmaster General reports to the Postmaster General that reductions amounting to \$314,664 were made in the expenses of the Star Route service during July. The reductions previously reported amount to \$1,066,778, making a total saving since March 4 last of \$1,381,442. As the Department shows a deficiency each year of only \$2,000,000 there is a fair prospect of its becoming self-supporting soon.

Mr. Orville Grant, brother of ex-President Grant, and who for some time past has been an inmate of the State Asylum for the Insane at Morris Plains, N. J., died Friday. His remains were taken to Elizabeth for interment.

Orville Grant was born in 1835, and was the only surviving brother of General Grant. He was engaged in the hide, leather and saddlery-hardware business in Galena and for some years in company with C. R. Perkins. After his brother Ulysses, whom he had assisted in his early struggles, was elected President he came East and became known as a contractor. He did not prosper, however, and falling into bad habits, has been for several years considered insane.

According to the last report of the commissioners of agriculture it appears that 7,000,000 persons in the United States are engaged in farming pursuits. The total value of farms and farm implements is \$13,471,200,433, or two-thirds of the productive wealth of the nation. The value of farm products and live stock for 1878 was \$3,000,000,000 against \$2,800,000,000 of mining and manufacturing products. From this it appears that not

only a majority of the adult population of the United States is engaged in agriculture, but that more than one-half the wealth of the country is invested in that industry.

Conflicting reports in regard to the crops continue to come in. The large deficiency reported two and three weeks ago has been made to appear less and less by succeeding reports, but it is clear that there is going to be a considerable shortage as compared with last year's yield. The latest dispatches to the Chicago Times are to the effect that the corn crop promises to be very light in those great corn producing States, Illinois, Missouri and Iowa. The reports from the cotton crop are assuring. The first instalment of the new crop was received in Mobile on Wednesday.

Cremation as a business does not pay. The trustees of the Le Moyne estate, at Washington, Pa., have decided not to take any more jobs of this kind for the oven there, as on every subject money has been lost. When the elder Le Moyne lived, he regarded his eccentric revival of the ancient mode of disposing of the dead as sure to become a general one. He was an earnest man, enthusiastic in science, but unpractical in many respects.
