WASHINGTON, D. C., AUG. 7, 1881. Public anxiety now that the President has rallied so completely from the severe relapse of ten days ago, has given way to a strong feeling of hope, even confidence a reasonable time, unless local inflamation be set up in the region where the affair. ball is located, which would appear now to be the principal danger to the distinguished patient. The bulletin of this morning is not quite as satisfatory as for several days past, but no alarming symptoms are reported, and hope still prevails as the high temperature and the excessive humidity of the atmosphere for the past few days might account for any slight change for the worse in his case.




