George Firman Horton, A. B., M. D., Terrytown; Rensselaer School, Troy, N. Y., 1827 and Geneva Medical College, honorary degree of M. D., 1864.

Doctor Horton also submitted the following interesting statement:

I, George Firman Horton being duly sworn according to law, do depose and say that I commenced the practice of Medicine in March 1828, at Terrytown, Pa., I graduated at Rensselaer's School in the city of Troy, N. Y., on the 27th of June 1827. In 1828 and '29 I attended lecturers in the Medical Department of Rutgers College, in the city of New York. I have practiced physic and surgery continuously ever since 1829 without any change of location, settling at Terrytown, within a stone's throw of the old log house in which I was born a 2 o'clock a. m. of the 2nd of January A. D. 1806.

In 1834 and '35 I occasionally attended lectures in Jefferson Medical College in the city of Philadelphia.

In 1866 Geneva Medical College, unsolicited, conferred upon me the honorary degree of M. D. and sent me a Diploma, which is herewith presented together with a copy of the same; also the Diploma of Rensselaer School, with a copy. I am a member of the American Medical Association, from the second year of its organization in 1847, and a permanent member since 1858; also a member of the Medical Society of Pennsylvania, (its president in 1862,) and of the state Medical Society of Connecticut, and last, and not least prized by me, one of the founders and continuous members of the Bradford County Medical Society.
