### OFFICIAL BULLETIN.

AUGUST 12, 7 P. M.

The President has passed a comfortable day. At the evening dressing, the wound was found to be doing well. The quantity of pus secreted is gradually diminishing, and its character is healthy. The rise of temperature this afternoon reached the same place as yesterday. At present his pulse is 108, temperature 101.2, respiration 19.

The following was sent by the Acting Secretary of State to Minister Lowell last evening: The President's wound is doing well. The pus is diminished and healthy. The afternoon rise of temperature is the same as yesterday. His appetite is improving.
