#### OFFICIAL BULLETINS.

AUGUST 14, 8:30 A. M.

The President slept well during the night, and this morning expresses himself as feeling comfortable. The temperature is one degree less than at the same time yesterday. His general condition is good. Pulse, 100; temperature, 99.8; respiration, 18.

12:30 P. M.

The President has done well this morning. His temperature has fallen half a degree since the last bulletin was issued. At the morning dressing the condition of the wound was found to be excellent and the discharge of pus adequate and healthy. His pulse is, 96; temperature, 99.3; respiration, 18.

6:30 P. M.

The condition of the President has not materially changed since noon. The afternoon feverish rise is about the same as yesterday. Pulse, 108; temperature, 100.8; respiration, 19.
