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## Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Republican County Committee in session Friday June 24, 1881, the Convention of the Republican party for 1881 will convene at the COURT HOUSE in TOWANDA BOROUGH on TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, at ONE O'CLOCK, P. M., to make the following nominations for county officers, to wit:

- One person for Sheriff.
- One person for Prothonotary, &c.
- One person for Register and Recorder, &c.
- One person for Treasurer.
- Two persons for County Commissioners.
- Two persons for County Auditors.

And for the transaction of any other business that may come before the convention.

The Committees of Vigilance of the several election districts will call primary meetings at the usual places of holding Delegate elections for their respective districts, for SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3D, 1881, to elect by BALLOT two delegates to represent each district in said county convention.

The delegate elections in the BOROUGHs will be organized at SIX O'CLOCK, P. M., and be kept open continuously, to close at 8 o'clock, p. m. In the districts of Barclay, North Towanda and Athens District No. 3, from FIVE O'CLOCK, P. M., continuously until 7 o'clock p. m., at which time they shall close. And in all other townships from THREE o'clock, p. m., continuously until FIVE o'clock, p. m., at which time they shall close. The votes shall then be counted and the result certified by the proper officers of said meetings to the Chairman of said Convention and a copy delivered at once to the delegates elect.

The Committees of Vigilance are particularly requested to give at least three weeks' written or printed notice of the said primary elections, and to carefully observe the above rules in conducting the said primary meetings.

Only Republicans can participate in said meetings.

## Protecting the Widow.

The subject of building and savings associations on a partly new plan is attracting attention. In the old associations, in the event of death the widow of the workingman often has no way of continuing the monthly payments, and the property is seized by the association, which sells it to the highest bidder. Of course she receives back the savings of the family, with six per cent interest, provided the property has not depreciated in value.

The new plan provides for the widow's protection by associating with the old style of payment of monthly dues the new feature of paying a small sum additional per share as an insurance fund. This insurance fee enables the society to guarantee to the family of any deceased member the commutation of the payment of monthly dues without cost to the widow, children or other heirs, until the society runs out. Suppose a man has six shares on which he pays \$6 a month. He also pays twenty cents extra per share per month for his insurance fee, making his entire monthly payment \$7.20. At the end of the year he has paid \$14.40 for his insurance. The society has received it and he, as one of the members, has still an interest in it. Suppose he buys out his six shares and receives \$1080, for which he purchases a home. If he dies a week after the purchase, the widow at once becomes the possessor of a home, and the building association keeps up the monthly payments.

All members of the society are examined by a doctor the same as in any insurance company. Members between 21 and 55 years of age only are taken. The mean therefore is 38 years. Ordinary life insurance for \$1000 for one year in old line companies on persons 38 years of age costs more than \$14.40 paid to the building association each year. After a building association has been in progress a few years its membership generally numbers about 400. All together they hold about 1,500 shares. Each month therefore the society receives \$1,500 as dues paid in and \$300 insurance fund. The insurance fund amounts to \$3,600 per year. If no one dies that year the amount becomes a reserve fund. If at any time a member who has been in good standing for any period finds that he can not continue his payments, he can draw out all the money he has paid in for dues with six per cent interest, but his insurance money he forfeits.

In a trial of the sheaf binding machines at the Royal Agricultural Society exhibition at Derby, England, there were nine competitors. McCormick's harvesting machine of Chicago, was awarded the first prize and gold medal, and W. Johnson's harvester of New York, the silver medal.

There is a White House problem which the Buffalo Express, bright and penetrating as it is, professes itself unable to solve. "A great deal of money," it says, "is annually spent in repairing the White House. The sum during the last fiscal year was \$30,000. These repairs are supposed to

be heating, plumbing, etc., but there is neither ventillation nor plumbing. Who can understand government affairs? What private citizen could spend \$30,000 a year on house repairs, and still have his house eternally out of repair?" The Express has evidently run against one of those things "which no fellow can find out." There are several of them in Washington.

When Sitting Bull heard of the killing of Spotted Tail, he said it was a fitting end for a fool. Bull claims that he surrendered when he should have kept on the war-path. Two squaws were caught carrying ammunition and guns into Sitting Bull's camp. He undoubtedly means mischief, and if he says a word many young bucks at the agency will follow him. Trouble may be expected at any moment unless more troops are sent to that vicinity.

The funeral of Gen. Robert Patterson was largely attended. The pall-bearers included Generals Grant, Sherman, Porter and Hancock, John Welsh and Judge Biddle were present and Generals Schofield, Sickles, Hartranft, and Congressman Kelly.
