AUGUST 14, 6:30 P. M.

The irritability in the President's stomach returned during the afternoon and he has vomited three times since one o'clock. Although the afternoon rise of temperature is less than it has been for several days, the pulse and respiration are more frequent, so that his condition is on the whole less satisfactory. His pulse is now 130; temperature, 99.6; respiration, 22.

The following was sent to ex-President Hayes, at Fremont, O: Have reached another very serious point in the case. The condition at this hour, (8 p. m.) are of a character that cause great anxiety. We hope for better things in the morning.
