OFFICIAL BULLETINS.

AUGUST 16, 7 P. M.

The President's symptoms are still graye, yet he seems to have lost no ground during the day, and his condition on the whole is rather better than yesterday. At present his pulse is 120; temperature, 98.9; respiration, 19.

The following was sent to Minister Lowell at 11 p. m.: Since noon there has been a slight rise in the temperature of the President. He vomited but once during the afternoon. Nourishment by enemata is retained. His condition on the whole is rather better than yesterday.
