Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Republican County Committee in session Friday June 24, 1881, the Convention of the Republican party for 1881 will convene at the COURT HOUSE in TOWANDA BOROUGH on TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, at ONE O'CLOCK, P. M., to make the following nominations for county officers, to wit:

- One person for Sheriff.
- One person for Prothonotary, &c.
- One person for Register and Recorder, &c.
- One person for Treasurer.
- Two persons for County Commissioners.
- Two persons for County Auditors.

And for the transaction of any other business that may come before the convention.

The Committees of Vigilance of the several election districts will call primary meetings at the usual places of holding Delegate elections for their respective districts, for SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3D., 1881, to elect by BALLOT two delegates to represent each district in said county convention.

The delegate elections in the BOROUGHS will be organized at SIX O'CLOCK, P. M., and be kept open continuously, to close at 8 o'clock, p. m. In the districts of Barclay, North Towanda and Athens District No. 3, from FIVE O'CLOCK, P. M., continuously until 7 o'clock p. m., at which time they shall close. And in all other townships from THREE o'clock, p. m., continuously until FIVE o'clock, p. m., at which time they shall close. The votes shall then be counted and the result certified by the proper officers of said meetings to the Chairman of said Convention and a copy delivered at once to the delegates elect.

The Committees of Vigilance are particularly requested to give at least three weeks' written or printed notice of the said primary elections, and to carefully observe the above rules in conducting the said primary meetings.

Only Republicans can participate in said meetings.

The attempt to pass a prohibitory liquor law in North Carolina has failed, the constitutional amendment being voted down on Thursday last by a large majority. Unfortunately the matter was made one of party. The Democrats originated and advocated the amendment and the Republicans opposed it. The negro vote was what settled the issue, and the way in which the vote was manipulated shows the imperative need of educating those to whom the ballot has been given. The negroes were suspicious of the movement from the first, because of its origin, and their ignorance and fears were worked upon in the most unscrupulous manner by the Republican leaders, many of whom were engaged in the manufacture and sale of liquor. For instance, it is said the negroes were told that the law proposed would break down the public schools, take the right to vote from the freedmen, and actually reduce them to slavery again. A fair specimen of the effect of these falsehoods can be seen from this passage from a sermon preached by one of the colored ministers: "De Scriptures say dat dere shall be one law fur all and dey is tryin' to take de whiskey from de poor cullud man, and let de rich white man drink all he wants. I've got a head of my own—I'm not to be turned about by larned professors." With such material as this to work upon, it is not strange that the "poor cullud man" was induced to vote for his greatest curse, and the thing that makes him a slave indeed. As a political victory, it is one that any party well might wish its opponent to have rather than itself.—*Examiner and Chronicle.*

The House of Lords, through its tory element, hope to defeat Mr. Gladstone's Irish Land Bill at the present session. The rejecting of the most sweeping clauses has greatly excited the country. The battle is set in array between plutocracy and democracy. Mr. Gladstone is understood to have said that he would not yield a hair's breadth, and will issue an appeal to the country, showing that the work of an entire session has been lost by the few hours' opposition of the recalcitrant House of Lords. Radicalism is rampant and demands the abolition of this body under the cry of "Down with the Oligarchy." Members were summoned hastily from leaves of absence, on Saturday, to be present at the final struggle. Grouse hunting surrendered all its votaries to the high demands of State perils. The campaign will be a vigorous and eventful one. And Mr. Gladstone will allow Parliament to adjourn and resume the subject in the next, rather than yield an inch.

The figures for August 1st, showing the condition of the crops, will be found to vary much from the July showing. The report will show a loss on the wheat crop, compared with last year, 70 per cent greater than it appeared from the July statement, or a shortage in the neighborhood of 125,000,000 bushels. The corn crop will make a better showing than in July, while cotton and tobacco will be fair.

A meeting of fifty men and two women was held in Boston last week for the purpose of sympathizing with Hartmann, the Nihilist. Speeches denouncing Russian tyranny, were made and a committee appointed to invite Hartmann to address a public meeting there. No persons of prominence figured in the assemblage.

A few years ago M. Montigny called attention to the fact that the scintillation of stars is considerably increased during aurora borealis. Further data on this subject are afforded in a recent issue of the bulletin of the Belgian Academy. Among other things, he has observed that the phenomenon is more pronounced in winter than in summer, and that stars in the northern regions show the increased scintillation most. The author's general conclusion is that the effect is not one due to direct influence of the electro-magnetic light of aurora on scintillation itself, but to disturbances (probably a cooling) which coincide with the appearance of aurora in the upper regions of the air, traversed by the star-rays.
