He has asked for and retained liquid nourishment much more than yesterday. The enemata continues to be successfuly used. Pulse, 108 temperature, 98 ; respiration, 18.

The President has done well during the day and has taken addittional nourish ment by his mouth this afternoon with evident relish and without subsequent nasuea. There is some rise of temperiture, but his general condition is rather better than at this time yesterday. Pulse, ; temperature, 100 ; respiration, 18.
