Quite a good deal of interest has been manifested this week in the proceedings had at the Bradford House, South Waverly borough, in relation to the assessment of damages done in the construction of the N.Y.L. & W.R.R. through the farm known as the HARRIS MURRAY farm. On application of the MURRAYS the Court at Towanda appointed the following named gentlemen: Hon. C. S. RUSSELL, J. H. CODDING, Esq., GEO. H. VANDIKE, EDWARD WALKER and WM. SNYDER, commissioners to view, assess and report the damages above referred to the Court at the September term.

The commissioners met for the first time on Tuesday, and after being duly sworn by the sheriff, PETER J. DEAN, took a stroll over the lands and then convened at the Bradford House for the purpose of taking testimony on the value of the lands, etc. JOHN F. SANDERSON, Esq., of the law firm of OVERTON & SANDERSON, appeared as counsel for the petitioners, the MURRAY'S, and Messrs PECK & OVERTON appointed railroad company, and also for Hon. A. C. HOWARD, of Providence, R. I., who claims to own the land in question, subject only to the life estate of Mrs. MURRAY, relict of the late HARRIS MURRAY, deceased.

The testimony of witnesses on the question of value of land was amusing to say the least, some of them putting the price at \$400 to \$500 per acre, and others calling it from \$1,000 to \$2,000 per acre. How judgments differ! From the points taken by the counsel, we opine that a long and costly litigation in relation to the ownership of the property will be indulged in by the petitioners and Gov. HOWARD.

It would not be wise for us now to attempt to guess how the matter will end, except that the lawyers will do a great deal of hard work, and of course be handsomely remunerated therefor, as they ought to be.—Waverly Free Press.

The National Guard.

Capt. WILT has issued the following General Order to his company:

ARMORY Co. "A," 9th Regt. N. G. Pa. / TOWANDA, PA., August 4th, 1881.

GENERAL ORDER No. 9.

I. General Order No 4 from Division Headquarters fixes the time for the Encampment from August 23d to August 29th 1881, at WilkesBarre, Pa.

II. Transportation, camp and garrison equipage, and subsistence will be furnished.

III. The annual inspection by the Adjutant General, during said encampment, is announced to take place on Thursday August 25th, at 3 p. m.

IV. The Brigade will be reviewed by the Commander-in-Chief on Saturday August 27th at 4 p. m.

V. The Commander-in-Chief, in General Order No. 12, announces the following:

"The inspection will be rigorous. Especial attention will be given to care and condition of clothing and equipments, and number of articles of each on hand. All rolls must be completed as near as may be before leaving the rendezvous. These encampments are held under the provisions of, and by authority of the law. It is mandatory, and requires the attendance of all who hold commissions or are serving a term of enlistment.

"Excuses for absence will be entertained for such reasons only as would prevail in actual service. Officers and men can only be absent from this service by permission of the Brigade Commander.

"To be effective and instructive, the encampment demands the continuous attendance of each individual for the whole time provided for. There will be no payment for partial service. If a leave of absence or furlough be granted upon surgeon's certificate of disability, where the disability arises in camp, or by reason of serious illness or death in the soldier's family, occurring while he is on his tour of duty, the payment will be in full."

VI. The encampment will occupy but six days, and you will receive pay for five, requiring you to lose one day only. In accordance with orders from headquarters, none can be excused from the attendance at this encampment, except by the Brigade Commander.

VII. All fines and dues for non-attendance at drills, are hereby remitted up to June 8th 1881. From this date, (June 8th), all fines will be charged and reported to Headquarters, in accordance with the law now in force. The fines for non attendance at regular drills are as follows: Commissioned officers, 25 cts., Sergeants 20, Corporals 15, privates, 10 For absence from a company parade the following are the fines fixed: Commissioned officers fifty cents; sergeants, forty cents; corporals, thirty cents; privates, twenty cents.

VIII. The book, "The Sentinel and his Duties," will be issued to each member of the company, as company property. A careful study of the book will be required. Officers and men must understand guard mounting and their duties, while serving a tour of guard. Hereafter members of the company will be reprimanded or punished for ignorance of Guard mounting or the duties of a sentinel.

IX. The members of the company will report at the Armory on Saturday, 20 of August, 1881 at one o'clock P. M. sharp for an out door drill and company parade, with knapsack, haversack and canteen.
