The following sketch of a former principal of the old Towanda Academy, who died last week, will be read with interest by our older citizens and those who were pupils of Mr. GUNN more than thirty years ago. The notice is taken from the New York Herald of last Thursday.

Frederick W. Gunn, principal of "The Gunnery" School in Washington, Ct., died at his home yesterday. Although not strictly a public man, Mr. Gunn's character and attainments made him a man of considerable influence, and the pronounced originality of his professional ideas gave him celebrity as a teacher. He was born in Washington in 1816 and was graduated at Yale College with the class of 1837, together with Chief Justice Waite, ex-Secretary of State Evarts, Professors Silliman and Lyman, Hon. Edwards Pierpont and others. The success of the school that he started shortly after graduation was interfered with by his advocacy of abolition principles, in behalf of which he was most active, speaking in public and assisting in the escape of runaway slaves. The expulsion of Mr. Gunn's father from the Congregational Church, for espousing the same cause, was followed by the persecution of the son, who was forced to seek a living by teaching in Pennsylvania for a time; but he shortly returned and lived it down, becoming one of the most honored citizens of Connecticut. Some of the peculiar features of his school have been chronicled by Dr. Holland in his "Arthur Bonnicastle," where Mr. Gunn and the "Gunnery" appear as "Mr. Bird and the Bird's Nest," and by W. Hamilton Glenn, the artist, in his "Pastoral Days," in which with pen and pencil he celebrated his alma mater under the name of "The Snuggery," kept by Mr. Snug in Snug Hamlet. For many years Mr. Gunn would have no rules for the regulation of his pupils; but governed them on the theory that boys as well as men know instinctively the difference between right and wrong, and he held them responsible for correct behavior. His punishments were always unique and were designed rather for the correction of the faults than for the infliction of pain or penalty. He delighted in nature, and possessed a wonderfully intimate knowledge of forest and field, of plant and bud life, and in his generous readiness to impart his knowledge he was to all his friends something better than a Burroughs or a Thoreau. His pupils were encouraged in every way to familiarize themselves with nature. He guarded against the danger of a free use of fire arms by the following order:—"Never permit a boy to aim an unloaded gun at you; if you do not knock him down I will thrash you. Never mind the loaded guns, they never hurt any one; it is the empty ones that do all the mischief." Every year he took the boys into camp, and "Gunn's Camp" was one of the features of summer life at Lake Waramung. In teaching the classics Mr. Gunn sought first to make his scholars familiar with the literature of the authors in hand, leaving a more thorough grammatical training until the writer's style and the scope of his work were well comprehended. A large benevolence, the extent of which few persons knew, interfered with his acquiring wealth, although his institution was flourishing and prosperous. Among the patrons of "The Gunnery" were Henry Ward Beecher, Mrs. Stowe, General John C. Fremont, Senator Platt, Senator Dixon, Dr. J. G. Holland, A. S. Barnes, John T. Howard and others. Mr. Gunn was married in 1847 to Miss Abby Brinsmade, daughter of General Brinsmade, of Connecticut. Their only son died several

years ago. Mrs. Gunn and a daughter, Mrs. John C. Brinsmade, survive him. The funeral services will be held in Washington on Friday.
