In the meantime a creeping baby overturned the vessel and scalded itself so terribly that it died in a short time thereafter. Both children bitten by the snake also died. In one of the monthlies for September there is a very attractive and beautifully illustrated paper on the Thousand Islands. Among others notices it has the following: "Manhattan Island is composed of three islands, if you will pardon the Hibernicism. These little islands are joined together by pretty rustic bridges thrown across the dividing channels, and here form the settlement known as Manhattan Island. At Packers Island three similar fragments make a unit in a similar manner. The latter is owned by the family of the late Judge ASA PACKER of Pennsylvania, whose beneficent life and munificent testamentary disposition of his vast estate have won such proud and just distinction. At night the islands which are built upon present a beautiful spectacle. Many of them have adopted devices contrived by means of colored lights. One is a heart, others are anchors, crosses, stars and circles, and their effect is extremely beautiful, reflected upon the smooth surface of the river."
