Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Republican County Committee in session Friday June 24, 1881, the Convention of the Republican party for 1881 will convene at the COURT HOUSE in TOWANDA BORO' GH on TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, at ONE O'CLOCK, P. M., to make the following nominations for county officers, to wit:

- One person for Sheriff.
One person for Prothonotary, &c.
One person for Register and Recorder, &c.
One person for Treasurer.
Two persons for County Commissioners.
Two persons for County Auditors.

And for the transaction of any other business that may come before the convention.

The Committees of Vigilance of the several election districts will call primary meetings at the usual places of holding Delegate elections for their respective districts, for SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3D., 1881, to elect by BALLOT two delegates to represent each district in said county convention.

The delegate elections in the BOROUGHS will be organized at SIX O'CLOCK, P. M., and be kept open continuously, to close at 8 o'clock, p. m. in the districts of Barclay, North Towanda and Athens District No. 3, from FIVE O'CLOCK, P. M., continuously until 7 o'clock p. m., at which time they shall close. And in all other townships from THREE o'clock, p. m., continuously until FIVE o'clock, p. m., at which time they shall close. The votes shall then be counted and the result certified by the proper officers of said meetings to the Chairman of said Convention and a copy delivered at once to the delegates elect.

The Committees of Vigilance are particularly requested to give at least three weeks' written or printed notice of the said primary elections, and to carefully observe the above rules in conducting the said primary meetings.

The REVIEW is not an organ. No one except the editors is responsible for its utterances on any question. It is our aim to so conduct the paper as not to do any one injustice, and nothing was farther from our thoughts than intention to injure the political prospects of Mr. HULL of Athens, when we penned the following paragraph the other day:

The announcement this week of C. T. Hull as a candidate for County Treasurer has created quite a stir among many Republican politicians. The fact that the announcement was made immediately after a well-known "boss" manipulator from the western part of the county had been in Athens "looking at horses," is considered very suggestive.

But our usually level-headed, good-natured cotemporary, the Athens Gazette got terribly "riled" over it and pronounced the statement a falsehood. With all deference to neighbor Hinton's assumed knowledge in the premises we beg leave to ask him to retract. The statement of the Review was literally true. The announcement of Mr. Hull's candidacy was made simultaneously with a visit to Athens from the gentleman referred to, and this fact was considered suggestive by some Republicans. We did not say the two events had any connection, but simply that some people coupled them. It makes little difference to us who the nominee for Treasurer or any other office is, only that they are good men, and the party cannot afford to nominate bad men. We have no doubt the nomination of Mr. Hull would be satisfactory to the Republicans of the county, and we can see no reason why he may not be a candidate with as much propriety as any of the gentlemen who aspire to the position. As to the charge of infidelity made by some of his rivals, that is a question he must meet himself. In the long run men find it better to be honest in politics as well as business, and the tricks by which politicians seek to advance their interests at the expense of honor do not long avail with an impartial constituency.

This is not intended as a reflection on any one, as we have no knowledge implicating any of the candidates with chicanery or unfairness in the present canvass. We simply make the suggestion that it will not be safe for them to resort to such means.
