BULLOCK and Capt. B. B. MITCHELL, Secretaries.

On motion, the Chairman appointed the following committee on Resolutions: N. C. ELSBREE, R. R. PALMER, J. F. GILLET, B. B. MITCHELL and E. G. OWEN.

After deliberation the Committee reported the following which were unanimously adopted:

1. *Resolved*, That we denounce in unmeasured terms the dastardly, wicked attack of the assassin Guiteau upon the life of President Garfield, and heartily join with our fellow countrymen of all sections in extending our sympathy to himself and his family, with the hope that through the blessing of Divine Providence he may yet recover to resume the reins of government, and carry out the policy so auspiciously entered upon. That we rejoice with joy unspeakable, that the improvement in the condition of the President in the past few days affords a lively hope of his ultimate and full recovery.

2. *Resolved*, That we congratulate the country upon the wise and successful financial policy of the past and of the present National Administrations, and especially do we commend the efforts of the present administration to root out organized corruption in every department of the government as evidenced in the prosecution of the conspirators in the Star-route and other frauds.

3. *Resolved*, That we commend the course of Hon. Edward Overton, our member of the last Congress from this district, who represented faithfully and with honor and ability the interests of his constituents.

4. *Resolved*, That the general prosperity of all the material industries of our Commonwealth evinces the wisdom and soundness of our present State administration.

5. *Resolved*, That we approve the course of our Senator and Representatives in the last Legislature; their independent action relative to the choice of United States Senator was demanded by an outspoken, pronounced sentiment of their constituents, and in acting with respect to that sentiment they but performed a recognized public duty.

6. *Resolved*, That we emphatically declare as the sense of this Convention, that the compensation of the County Treasurer should be reduced, fifteen hundred dollars or less per annum. In no event to exceed that amount, and we earnestly recommend that our County Commissioners so fix the Treasurer's compensation.

7. *Resolved*, That in making purchases for the County Poor House, we recommend that the Commissioners take, bills in duplicate of all purchases, and that one copy of all bills be filed with the Superintendent of the Poor House at the time of delivery of the goods purchased, and that he keep a book of entry of same in detail.

8. *Resolved*, That this Convention representing the sentiment of the Republicans of Bradford County, earnestly recommend the nomination of Hon. W. T. DAVIES by the Republican State Convention, which assembles on Thursday next, for the office of State Treasurer, believing that his nomination would be eminently wise and proper in the present political exigencies in Pennsylvania, and would insure party success.

9. *Resolved*, That as the representatives of the Republican sentiment of Bradford County we declare that it is the duty of the Legislature to submit to a vote of the people a proposition to so amend the Constitution of the State as to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors except for medicinal and mechanical purposes.

For Sheriff, Capt. W. T. HORTON of Terry, and E. WALKER, of Towanda borough were placed in nomination. The ballot stood:

### The President's Condition.

#### Off for Long Branch!

Presidential train left 6:30 A. M. for Long Branch. President bore transportation well with only some accumulation of pulse from the excitement.

President's train passed Union Depot, Baltimore at 8:04 without stopping.

As the Presidential train passed Havre-degrace the President appeared to be really enjoying the trip. The train is expected to reach Elberon between 1 and 2 P. M.

#### ALL RIGHT AT PHILADELPHIA.

The President passed West Philadelphia at 10:52 apparently all right.

#### SAFE ARRIVAL AT LONG BRANCH.

At 1:20 o'clock the President arrived at Long Branch. He was somewhat fatigued, as was expected, and very feverish. His pulse rose to 124 and his temperature to 101. At half past ten o'clock he was quietly sleeping and in is hoped this morning will find him much better.

## OFFICIAL BULLETINS.

6:30 P. M.

Since the last bulletin was issued the President has been moved from Washington to Long Branch. He was more restless than usual last night, being evidently somewhat excited by the anticipations of the journey. This morning at 5:30 his pulse was 118; temperature, 99.8; respiration, 18. We left Washington with the President at 6.30 A. M. Owing to the admirable arrangements made by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and the ingeniously arranged bed designed by T. N. Ely, the fatigue incident to transportation was reduced to a minimum. Nevertheless, as was anticipated, some signs of disturbance produced by the journey, have been exhibited since his arrival by the rise of temperature and the increased frequency of his pulse. At present his pulse is 124, temperature 101.6, respiration 18.

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
