## Court Proceedings.

Commonwealth vs. O. P. Taylor, assault and battery; defendant pleads guilty. After hearing evidence Court sentenced defendant to pay a fine of ten cents and costs of prosecution.

Com. vs. Patrick Ward, larceny; defendant pleads guilty.

Com. vs. Joseph Pool, aggravated assault and battery; Dist. Atty Fanning and William H. Thompson, Esq., for Com., James T. Hale, Esq., for defendant. Jury find defendant not guilty, and divide the costs equally between the prosecutor, Whitfield Keen and the defendant, Joseph Pool.

Com. vs. Patrick Brophy, assault and battery; Dist. Atty Fanning and William Maxwell, Esq., for Com. S. W. Little, Esq., for defendant. Jury find defendant not guilty, but that he pay two-thirds of the costs, and Julia Blake, the prosecutrix, one third.

Com. vs. Ferdinand A. Wheeler, felonious assault; Dist. Atty Fanning for Com. L. M. Hall and John N. Califf, Esq., for defendant. Jury find defendant guilty.

Com. vs. Sherman Bradley, assault and battery; Dist. Atty Fanning and N. C. Elsbree, Esq., for Com. I. McPherson and James T. Hale, Esqs., for defendant. Jury find defendant guilty.

Com. vs. Morty McAcy and Timothy Sullivan, assault and battery; Nolle prosequi entered on first count of indictment; defendants plead guilty on second. Timothy Sullivan sentenced to pay a fine of \$20, and costs of prosecution, Morty McAcy to pay a fine of \$30 and costs of prosecution, and each to enter into a recognizance in the sum of \$300, conditioned for good behavior.

Com. vs. Frank Sweazay, stealing a horse; Dist. Attorney Fanning and L. M. Hall, Esq., for Com. I. McPherson and S. W. Little, Esqs., for defendant. Jury find defendant guilty.

Com. vs. Patrick Higgins and William Fassett, forcible entry; Dist. Attorney Fanning, J. N. Califf and H. J. Madill, Esqs., for Com. W. H. and E. A. Thompson for defendants. Jury find defendants not guilty, but that they pay two-thirds the costs and the prosecutor John Cullihan, one-third the costs.

Com. vs. J. A. Pendleton, forgery; Dist. Atty Fanning, Gridley & Payne and Overton & Sanderson for Com. N. C. Elsbree, H. N. Williams and L. M. Hall, Esqs., for defendant. On trial.
