The war in railway passenger rates is renewed with greater vigor than ever. The guage thrown down by Mr Vanderbilt has been taken up by all the competitive companies, and the low rates offered by the Central lines are underbid by the Grand Trunk, the Pennsylvania and the Baltimore and Ohio. The strife opens in the West this time and takes a wider range than the earlier contests, at least one of the lines selling round trip tickets to Boston, good for thirty days at \$10. Owing to the arbitrary rates charged from New York, passengers from Chicago to Boston over the Pennsylvania road will mand his withdrawal. be carried from Chicago to New York for 25 cents. 
