LONG BRANCH, SEPT. 16, 1881.
6 P. M.

At the examination of the President at 12 m to-day, temperature was 99.8; pulse, 116; respiration, 21. At the evening dressing at 5:30, the temperature was 98.6; pulse, 104; respiration, 22. A slight febrile rise occurred at 11 a. m., and had entirely subsided at 2 p. m. The condition of the wound remains unchanged. The cough has not been so frequent or persistent, but the sputa still remains purulent. Nourishment and stimulants have been given in increased quantities without discomfort. Altogether his general condition cannot be said to be improved.
