### President Arthur's Proclamation.

The following has been issued:  
By the President of the United States of America, Proclamation:

WHEREAS, In His inscrutable wisdom, it has pleased God to remove from us the illustrious head of the Nation, James A. Garfield, late President of the United States; and

WHEREAS, It is fitting that the deep grief which fills all hearts should manifest itself with one accord toward the Throne of Infinite Grace and that we should bow before the Almighty and seek from Him that consolation in our affliction and that sanctification of our loss which he is able and willing to vouchsafe.

Now, therefore, in obedience to sacred duty and in accordance with the desire of the people, I, Chester A. Arthur, President of the United States of America, do hereby appoint Monday next, the 26th day of September, on which day the remains of our honored and beloved dead will be consigned to their last resting place on earth, to be observed throughout the United States as a day of humiliation and mourning. And I earnestly recommend that all the people assemble on that day in their respective places of divine worship, there to render alike their tribute of sorrowful submission to the will of Almighty God and of reverence and love for the memory and character of our late Chief Magistrate.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, the 22nd day of September, in the [L. S.] year of our Lord 1881, and of the Independence of the United States one hundred and sixth.

### Governor Hoyt's Proclamation.

Governor Hoyt has issued the following proclamation:  
In the name and by the authority of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:

The chastening hand of God has been heavily laid upon the nation and a beloved and honored Chief Magistrate has been removed by death in the beginning of an official career which promised to usher in an era of unexampled peace, prosperity and good will. The hearts of the people are bowed with sorrow for this great loss and they will, with sympathy for the bereaved wife and orphaned children, accept the duty of humble submission to the decree of the Ruler of the universe, and in order that the occasion upon which fitting public respect is being paid to the memory of James Abram Garfield, late President of the United States, may lead us to supplicate divine grace as well as for recognition of divine sovereignty, I, Henry M. Hoyt, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do appoint Monday next as a day of fasting and prayer, and recommend the people of the State to suspend all secular occupations and assemble themselves together in their respective places of worship on that day to unite in prayers to Almighty God for the welfare of the nation and its ruler, and that the grief of those who mourn may be comforted.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the State, at Harrisburg, this 22nd day of September, 1881, and of the Commonwealth the 106th.

### An Extra Session of the Senate.

The President has issued the following:  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 23, 1881.

Whereas matters of interest to the United States insist that the Senate should be convened at an early day to receive and act on such communications as may be made to it on the part of the Executive—

Now, therefore, I, Chester A. Arthur, President of the United States, have considered it to be my duty to issue this my proclamation, declaring that an extraordinary occasion requires that the Senate of the United States convene for the transaction of business at the Capitol in the city of Washington, on Monday, the 10th day of October next, at noon of that day; of which all at that time entitled to act as members of that body, are hereby required to take notice.

Given under my hand and the seal of the United States, at Washington, the 23d day of September, in the year of our Lord 1881, and of the independence of the United States, the 106th.

### Council Proceedings.

TOWANDA, Sept. 23, 1881.

Pursuant to a call of the Burgess, a meeting of the Borough Council was held on Friday evening the 23d inst., to take action on the proclamation of the President of the United States, relating to the appointment of Monday next to be observed as a day of humiliation and mourning, on which day the remains of our late beloved Chief Magistrate will be consigned to their last earthly resting place.

Members present—Burgess Alger, Frost, Gordon, Holcomb, Keeler and Spalding.

Councilman Holcomb submitted the following resolutions, which, on motion of Councilman Spalding, were unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, Through a dispensation of Providence, a great national calamity has fallen upon the country in the death of our greatly beloved President; and

WHEREAS, By proclamation of his constitutional successor, President Arthur, it is enjoined upon the people to observe Monday September 26 as a day of humiliation and mourning; therefore

Resolved, That the clergymen and people of Towanda and vicinity be invited to join in a union service of humiliation and mourning in the Court House square, at 2 o'clock p. m. on Monday September 26, A. D. 1881, as a fitting memorial of the death of our loved and lamented President.

Resolved, That the business men of Towanda be requested to close their places of business, and that the public offices should be closed on that day.

On motion, the Burgess appointed Messrs. Holcomb, Frost and Spalding a committee to confer with the clergy and make other necessary arrangements in relation to the proceedings of the day.

On motion adjourned.
