Born when Troy contained but a single log but, called in early manhood to God's minis-try, he had followed to the grave eight broth-and now himself stood on the verge of eter-nity. He seemed almost a patriarch as he be-sought those oresent to serve their God and as members of a noble family, which he traces for members of a noble family, which he traces for its origin, to a follower of William the Con-queror, to ever remain an bonor to the name of Rockwell. He was followed in appropriate remarks by Samuel Rockwell, of LeRoy, and Dr. M. S. Parsons, of Washington.

It was moved that if the Elder lived, and it is earnestly hoped he will, a similar meeting shall be held one year hence. The Gazette was chosen to contain a report of the meet-ing, and after a general leave taking, those present separated to go to their several homes conscious of a pleasantly spent day.
