A Correspondent of the Troy Gazette sends that paper the following;

**A PLEASANT PARTY.**—On Tuesday some seventy relatives met at the home of Rev. MYRON ROCKWELL in Roseville, to observe his 77th birthday. He has been forty years in the ministry; and to do honor to a long and useful life his own children and those of his eight dead brothers assembled. After several hours of pleasant intercourse, a tempting dinner was served, and at 1:30, p. m. the company proceeded to the Baptist church, where Elder Rockwell addressed them. His remarks were short but feeling, and not one heart was untouched as he reviewed his life. Born when Troy contained but a single log hut, called in early manhood to God's ministry, he had followed to the grave eight brothers and now himself stood on the verge of eternity. He seemed almost a patriarch as he besought those present to serve their God and as members of a noble family, which he traces for its origin, to a follower of William the Conqueror, to ever remain an honor to the name of Rockwell. He was followed in appropriate remarks by Samuel Rockwell, of LeRoy, and Dr. M. S. Parsons, of Washington.

It was moved that if the Elder lived, and it is earnestly hoped he will, a similar meeting shall be held one year hence. The Gazette was chosen to contain a report of the meeting, and after a general leave taking, those present separated to go to their several homes conscious of a pleasantly spent day. Profound sorrow for the President's death, was the only thing that marred the happiness of the occasion.
