

Council Proceedings.

The regular monthly session of the Council was held Monday evening October 3, 1881.—Members present, Chief Burgess Alger, in the chair and Councilmen Gordon, Holcomb, Keeler, Rahm and Spalding.

The minutes of last regular and special meetings were read and approved.

A petition was presented asking that the health destroying properties of Messrs. Daytons hide house on water street be removed and the nuisance abated. On motion it was ordered that notice be served on Mr. Dayton to cleanse and purify the locality without delay.

A petition was presented by Messrs. L. Elsbree and J. F. Sanderson for the grading of Locust Avenue, North William and Center streets. After some informal remarks and making an estimate of the expense, Mr. Holcomb moved to postpone action on the petition for the present, and on suggestion of Mr. Rahm the Council agreed to meet on the ground tomorrow, the 4th. inst., at 4 o'clock, p. m., and examine as to the propriety or necessity for granting the prayer of the petitioners at present.

By Councilman Bahm:
Resolved, That the street commissioner be and is hereby authorized to put down a good crossing from the Ward House to the Mercur block, at such point as the street committee may direct. Adopted.

Grand Army Of The Republic.

HEADQUARTERS BRADFORD CO., EN- CAMPMENT G. A. R. ATHENS, PA., October, 3d.

General Order, No. 2.

1. The Fifth Annual Encampment of the Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic of Bradford and adjoining counties and the reunion of the soldiers and sailors will be held in East Towanda, on the Fair Ground on the 11th, 12th and 13th of October, 1881.

2. All Posts, Military Companies, Soldiers, Sailors and Marines are invited to be present and participate in the encampment.

5. A general invitation is also extended to citizens who have an interest in the re-union and as visitors. Their presence heretofore has been a pleasant and agreeable feature of our encampment and we again offer them a soldier's greeting and bid them come.

4. Comrades to provide themselves with three days cooked rations, blankets, towels, and as far as possible with tents.

5. All the Posts, Companies, etc., are requested to report at headquarters by 1 o'clock p. m., Oct. 11th, and will make out duplicate rolls of their commands, one of which they will hand to the Adjutant of the encampment on reporting, and the other to be retained as the muster roll of the command.

6. Soldiers, etc., not members of any Post will attend with the Post they may choose or organize in separate companies, and elect their own officers, provided they number twenty or more.

7. The exercises will consist of drills, guard mounting, dress parade, sham battles, court martial, songs, speeches and camp-sports.

8. Distinguished speakers will be present and deliver addresses.

9. The sum of \$10 will be distributed as prizes to the three Posts showing the greatest proficiency in drill according to Upton's revised tactics: \$5 as first prize, \$3 as second prize, and \$2 as a third prize. All Posts competing for above prizes must have in the rank at least one half the number reported on the roll of the command.

10. It is with pride that we refer to the gentlemanly conduct of the different commands in former encampments. Let no act of unseemly conduct mar the propriety of this, and we shall show ourselves worthy the name of Comrade. Commanders of Posts and companies will be held responsible for the conduct of the men under their charge and are especially urged to prohibit intoxication so far as possible.

21. We extend a cordial invitation to the public generally, the ladies, and all who feel an interest in such a re-union, and we hope and trust that this annual gathering may foster a spirit of fraternal good will and patriot-

ic impulses that will be cherished in all our active life.

12. Lillie Post will be mounted and act as escort from Towanda to the campground in the forenoon of the first day.

13. Guard mount immediately after entering camp.
