**NEW COAL YARD.**—We were not aware until a visit to the premises yesterday, of the extensive improvements recently made at what is known as the OVERTON basin, near the Episcopal Church. A roadway has been constructed west of the railroad track and a substantial bridge thrown across the entrance to the basin, thus opening River street from the Bridge to the freight depot. On the west side of this road a large coal shed has been erected extending nearly to the new Church foundation, with sixteen bins, each of which will hold fifty tons of coal. The yard is enclosed by a high fence, and everything about it done in the most convenient and substantial manner. The work has been prosecuted under the supervision of T. M. WOODRUFF, Esq., by JAS. MACFARLANE, Esq., executor of the OVERTON estate and has been leased for a term of years by the S. L. & S. R. R. & Coal Co. The carpenter work was done by JAMES KINSMAN and one hundred and sixty thousand feet of lumber was consumed in the building and fence. A neat office and a set of Fairbank's scales stand at the entrance to the yard, which is connected with the L. V. R. R. by a "switch," so that coal will be dumped from cars directly into the bins. To-morrow morning Superintendent I. O. BLIGHT will begin retailing coal, not only the popular Loyal Sock, but the best quality of Pittston. Our old friend T. M. WOODRUFF will have charge of the office and yard, which will be sufficient guarantee to all who know him that customers will be courteously treated and orders promptly attended to.
