FIREMEN'S PARADE.—The annual parade of the Towanda Fire Department came off yesterday. The weather was all that could have been desired and the town wore a gala-day appearance. Firemen's hall was neatly decorated and over the door was placed in large letters, trimmed with evergreen, the hospitable legend, "Welcome." Flags were displayed and the brave firemen given other evidences of the kind feelings entertained for them by our citizens. On No. 7, at 11 o'clock, came the Waverly Hook and Ladder Co., accompanied by LaFrance's Band of Elmira.—They were met at the station by a large delegation of Franklin Engine Co., whose guests they were to be and their truck drawn to the engine house, preceded by the Germania Band. Over the main entrance to the Ward House, where the visiting firemen were quartered, an arch was sprung bearing the inscription, "Welcome Waverly H. & L. 2."

At 2 o'clock the procession moved in the following order: Councilmen in carriages; Fire Police; LaFrance Band; Waverly H. & L. Co. and their truck drawn by a team of horses; Germania Band; Franklin No 1, with hose carriage, followed by steamer drawn by four horses; Germania Band; Naiad No. 2, with hose cart and engine drawn by pair of horses; Liberty Corners Band; Mantua 4, with truck drawn by team.

The machines were all handsomely trimmed and seated on Naid engine was Master JOHNIE PIERCE, in the uniform of a fireman, and seated in a chair under a canopy made of flags, on Mantua's truck was a beautiful little girl. The line of march was the same as announced in the REVIEW. After the parade the Department was reviewed by the Town Council and addressed by Councilman HOLCOMB.

The most interesting feature of the celebration was the hose race between squads of the Franklins and Naiads. Each Company designated twelve men, commanded by their respective foremen; the feat to be performed, take the jumper from the engine house, run to a hydrant, make the coupling and lay

100 feet of hose. The weight of the loaded jumper was 1049 pounds, and the distance traveled 400 yards. The time made is the quickest on record. The Franklin team won the race in 1 minute 28 1-2 seconds, beating the Naiads just half a second.
