The supreme court, now meeting in Pittsburg rather astonished the members of the bar by their most remarkable number of reversals in the list of decisions rendered. Considerable unfavorable comment was indulged in on the present state of the State. Out of thirty-nine opinions there were no less than twenty-two reversals on the list. Every case from the courts of Cameron, Lancaster, Mifflin, Perry, Potter, Union, Centre, Tioga and Blair counties which appeared on the list were reversed.

The New York Post's Washington special says a near friend of the President says it has been finally decided to make no changes in the Cabinet until the December session unless some of the present Cabinet insist upon the acceptance of their resignations. No executive business will be brought before the Senate except nominations to fill existing vacancies. The question of the vacancy on the United States Supreme bench has not yet been determined.

The Telegram's Washington special states that Senator Harris of Tennessee says he thinks there is no question but that the Democrats will insist upon electing a Democratic President pro tem before receiving the credentials of the Senators-elect, but the Democrats are divided as to whether they will elect a Secretary before swearing in the Senators-elect. It seems to be the general opinion that the Republicans will not offer material opposition to the election of the President pro tem of the Senate by their opponents, but the fight will be made over the secretaryship. It is said an investigation will be called for when Senator Miller of New York presents his credentials on certain charges regarding his election.

The Brooklyn Eagle's Washington special says Col. Wm. H. McArdle, Democrat, of the Mississippi Journalist is a candidate for the Secretaryship of the Senate. He will have the support of the Georgia and Mississippi Senators with scattering strength from North Carolina, Alabama and Florida.

Ex-Secretary Evarts paid a glowing tribute to the late President in New York on Tuesday evening.

General Nathaniel P. Banks is shortly to deliver in Boston a eulogy upon President Garfield by invitation of the city authorities.

The Postmaster at Bethlehem holds one of the three commissions signed by the President the night before he was shot. He prizes the document very highly.

Messrs Dillon Egan, Thomas P. O'Connor, and James Redpath are among the passengers by the steamer City of Brussels, which sailed from Queenstown Thursday for New York.

The Japanese Minister, Mr. Yoshida, is convalescing from a three weeks' sickness. The popularity which this diplomat has acquired during his residence of about seven years in Washington is something quite unusual.

Dr. W. H. Hawkes has been appointed Acting Assistant Surgeon in the army, and is assigned to duty in Washington as assistant to Dr. Norris. Dr. Hawkes was tutor to the late President's sons and is a very popular gentleman.

Mrs. Thackara, Gen. Sherman's daughter, is to live in Philadelphia hereafter, as her husband has accepted a share in his father's business and will resign his post in the navy. General Sherman has now a sixth grandchild—the fifth child of his daughter Mrs. Fitch.
