Edwin D. Morgan.

The choice by President Arthur, of ex-Governor Morgan to be Secretary of the Treasury, must meet with universal approval. A practical and successful business man, accustomed to large commercial and financial transactions in the great money centre of the country, he has already rendered his State and Nation signal services which could have only come from one thoroughly schooled in an active, broad business life.

Edward Denniston Morgan was born in Washington, Berkshire county, Mass., February 8th, 1811. In 1839 he removed to New York where he engaged in mercantile pursuits in company with his brother, building up an extensive business, the transactions of the firm reaching all parts of this country and Europe. In 1855 he was appointed Commissioner of Emigration and held ihe office until 1858. When the Republican party was formed he gave it his support and was one of the Vice Presidents of the Republican Convention in Pittsburg in 1856; and from that time until 1864 was Chairman of the National Republican Committee. In 1858 he was elected Governor of the State of New York by the Republicans by a handsome majority. His administration was so able and commanded such general approval that he was again nominated in 1860, without opposition, and 3:00 o'clock p.m. for Bernice and intermediate sta. elected by a large majority. The second term was one of great labor and responsibility.

In 1861 President Lincoln commissioned Governor Morgan Major General of volunteers, in order to facilitate his labors in raising and organizing regiments. He held this rank until the close of his office, (January, 1863,) but declined all compensation. In the same year he was elected to the U.S. Senate by the Legislatare, and his whole course as a Senator was uniformly dignified and honorable to Arrives at 12 m. Leaves at 2 p.m. the State he represented. During his whole Senatorial career he held positions on important committees and rendered material and permanent service to the country.

, On the retirement of Secretary Fessenden from the office of Secretary of the Treasury, President Lincoln tendered the position to Senator Morgan, but the latter declined it, much to the regret of Mr. Lincoln.


