Edwin D. Morgan.

The choice by President Arthur, of ex-Governor Morgan to be Secretary of the Treasury, must meet with universal approval.

Edward Denniston Morgan was born in Washington, Berkshire county, Mass., February 8th, 1811. In 1839 he removed to New York where he engaged in mercantile pursuits in company with his brother, building up an extensive business, the transactions of the firm reaching all parts of this country and Europe.

In 1861 President Lincoln commissioned Governor Morgan Major General of volunteers, in order to facilitate his labors in raising and organizing regiments.

On the retirement of Secretary Fessenden from the office of Secretary of the Treasury, President Lincoln tendered the position to Senator Morgan, but the latter declined it, much to the regret of Mr. Lincoln.

It appears from the statement of Paul Strabach of Alabama, that the reported ill feeling between the German and French guests at Yorktown had its existence principally in the lively imaginations of newspaper correspondents.
