### Cure for Dyphtheria.

Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 18, 1881. EDITORS DAILY REVIEW :- During the past few weeks I have read of the ravages of diphtheria in one family at least in Towanda, also of other cases in and about your busy little town; also read an account of the "sulphur treatment" in the REVIEW. 1 wish in this letter to advance a few ideas as to the best mode of treatment employed by myself and other physicians in this city. Though we have no cases here now, we employed our plan most successfully last season. Make a fresh tincture of phytolacca decandria, or poke root, by maceration-15 drops in a half glass of water. Dose, a tes spoonful, alternately, with the same quantity of baptesia, or wild indigo, specific tincture, every hour, or two hours, according to the amount of redness or swelling of the tonsils or throat. Give these remedies from the insipiency of the disease, and continue till the membrane has all disappeared, and no sign is left of its returning. In the catarihal form, with discharges from the nostrils, mix the baptesia and phytolacea in one goblet, and alternate with bichromite of potassa. Second decimal trituration, ten grains dissolved in the same amount of water as the tinctures, I most always mix the pokeroot tincture and wild Indigo, from the start, and alternate with the bichromite of potassa. If the air passages seem to be filling with mucus, 1 give the foilowing decoction :

Blood root pulyerized, a teaspoonful, vinegar two or three table spoonfuls, white sugar a half tea cupful, boiling water half pint; boil for twenty minutes, stiring constantly: Dose, a tea spoonful every half hour, till relief is obtained, which usually occurs in two or three hours. If the bronchial rattling returns repeat the doses.

The croupous complicature without the rattling is best met with kali bichromic, and spongia tosta (toasted sponge tinct ure), five drops in half glassful of water, alternated with the potassa, a tea spoonful hourly. Quinina, in doses of two or four grains, according to age of patient, should be given from the outset every four or five hours, to be continued till the convolescence is well established, and one dose per day, as long as the heart shows any signs of fag. Pork in thin slices should be kept bound over the outside of the throat, and up under the ears over the sides of the neck, throughout the periods of swelling and exudation.

Do not apply any strong and irritating gargles, or swabs to the throat. If any gargle is used at all, take Tilden's Diphtherine, one teaspoonful, to a glassful of water, and allow a swallow to rince the throat every hour or two through the day. Let the patients sleep as much as they will. Let the diet be as nourishing as possible- Milk and
