The News Condensed.

Scoville is the most popular man in the Guitau trial.

President Arthur and other prominent gentlemen have been subpoenaed as witnesses in the Guitau trial.

The celebrated Pillsbury mill and four other large flouring mills were burned in Minneapolis yesterday morning. Six men were killed.

It is stated that a large number of western and southern Congressmen are determined to have the Star Route service continued, or at least to prevent a reduction of the service.

It is said that the amount of back taxes due the government by the New York banks has been ascertained to amount to \$700,000, and the prospects are that they will reach \$1,500,000.

Secretary Folger has rejected the offer of Leach and others, of Chicago, to compromise the judgments against them for whisky frauds, amounting to several hundred thousand dollars for a few thousand.

The Republican caucus in Washington Saturday evening nominated Keifer of Ohio, for Speaker, McPherson, of Pennsylvania, for Clerk, Hooker of Vt., for Sergeant-at-Arms, Brownlow, of Tenn., for Doorkeeper, Capt. Harvey Sherwood, Mich., for Postmaster, and Rev. F. D. Power, Washington, for Chaplain. The democratic caucus nominated the officers of the last House. The Greenbackers selected Ford, of Missouri, for Speaker, DeLa Matyr, for Clerk, Lee Crandall, Sergeant at Arms, H. M. Williams, Doorkeeper, W. H. C. Moore, postmaster.—The republicans are confident of electing their ticket.
