All owners of real estate should remember that under the laws of this Commonwealth all deeds and conveyances which are not recorded six months after they are made will be regarded as void and fraudulent against any subsequent purchaser, and hence it is of the highest importance that our farmer friends should examine their old deeds and see if the Recorder's certificate is indorsed upon them, with the time of record, book and page given. If the certificate is not indorsed, the deed has not been recorded. Persons having unrecorded deeds in their possession will have an excellent opportunity to bring or send them to the Recorder during the present session of Court.

GOOD TEMPLARS' CONVENTION.—The Northern district convention met at Good Templars' Hall Canton, Tuesday Nov. 29th at 11:30 a. m., W. C. T. Chase in the chair. Lodge opened with prayer by Chaplain. All admitted who had pass word or were properly vouched for. Committee appointed to make arrangements for evening's entertainment. After prayer by chaplain, adjourned.

AFTERNOON.—The lodge was opened in regular order at 2 o'clock. The following committees were appointed: Good of the order: Bros. Dartt, White, Sister Smith, and sister White. Com. on resolutions: Bros. D. W. Smith, Thos. Manley, and Butts. The following delegates were reported present: Canton, No. 498—B. S. Dartt, D. W. Smith, G. W. Griffin, 50 members in good standing.

East Canton No. 430—Norman Spaulding, E. S. Manley, sister Manley, 35 in good standing. North Towanda, No. 539—C. E. White, sister White, 23 members. South Creek No. 675—Sister Bertha Smith, Ella Smith, Bro. Ira Parsons, 37 members. Milan—J. E. Clough, J. M. Vincent, D. M. Deane, 35 members. Cold Water, No. 1087—Bros. A. W. Alger, E. Russell and H. A. Russell, 35 members. Herrick—Bros. Butts and McLarny. North Orwell was selected as the next place of meeting on the last day in February.

Discussion on "Good of order" called forth remarks from a number of Brothers present. Committee on good of order make partial report concerning arrangements for evening session. At 4:30 convention adjourned.

In the evening the Presbyterian church was comfortably filled. The exercises opened with singing by the choir; prayer by Brother D. W. Smith; address by brother Butts; singing, remarks by Bro's Smth, Guernsey, Dartt and Estell. Closed by benediction by Rev. Gates.

WEDNESDAY—Convention opened with W. C. T. Chase in the chair.

Reports of Dist. Deputies. Verbal report from Deputy Landon of East Canton, saying there were but two working Lodges in his district with four that were not in working order. Remarks by Brother Dartt in regard to Grover Lodge. Also further remarks by Bro. Landon in regard to same.

Various remarks about Alba Lodge. Remarks by Bro. Alger in regard to Temperance affairs at North Orwell and vicinity, showing good work in that section.

Remarks by Special Deputy, Bro. Butts, also report from South Creek Lodge by the W. C. T. Bro. Chase showing but one working Lodge in that district.

Remarks by Bro White in regard to organizing lodge in impracticable localities, and the mushroom variety, further remarks by W. C. T. on same.

Remarks by W. C. T. and Bro's Dartt and Alger on subject of collections. Question by Bro. Alger—How many times can a member visit a lodge without paying dues? W. C. T. referred to by-laws.

Remarks by Bro. Parsons, on subject, no member entitled to the pass word without payment of dues, and not entitled to seat in Lodge without pass word.

Report of committee on resolutions:

WHEREAS, The for against whom we are contending is powerful and aggressive, ruthlessly and relentlessly spreading desolation and ruin on every hand, regardless alike of the appeals of Mercy or the claims of Justice, and whereas the wisest and most efficient measures have thus far proven insufficient to brake up the obnoxious liquor traffic and rid society of this terrible scourge, therefore:

Resolved:—1. That we urge all temperance workers in every branch of the service to greater exertion.

2. That we earnestly invite all friends of humanity to join us in this great conflict for the right.

3. That we respectfully but earnestly urge upon every friend of society the reasonableness and importance of refusing under any and all circumstances to sign petitions for license to sell intoxicants.

4. That inasmuch as the supreme court of Pennsylvania rules that the granting of licenses is wholly at the discretion of the district judge, we shall continue to remonstrate against the granting of any licenses to sell intoxicants, leaving the judge and petitioners to take all the responsibility of forcing these pernicious pest-houses into our communities.

5. That we in unison with all other temperance lodges, demand of our state legislature as a right that that body affords us an opportunity to vote on the proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit the manufacture and sale of ardent spirits to be used as a beverage.

6. That the wholesale peddling of lager beer through the country, with the persistent efforts of the dealers to introduce the beverage into the families of respectable citizens is a new feature in the liquor traffic and one which demands the earnest attention of temperance workers. We therefore call upon all good people to unite in devising means for the suppression of this method of extending and increasing the sale of intoxicating beverages.

7. That our thanks are due the trustees of the Presbyterian church for the use of their house, and the good people for their hospitality in entertaining this convention.

Resolutions unanimously adopted.

Under head of the good of the order. Remarks were made by Bro's. Russell and Butts. Bro's. Butts and McLarny were appointed a committee to procure Geo. Landon to speak at next Convention. Minutes of session read. Bros. Bowman and Perry appointed committee to revise minutes for publication. Adjourned.
