FRIDAY—AFTERNOON.

Questions and answers were first taken up, the exercise proving very interesting. Messrs Burgan, Bovingdon, McGuire, J. B. Harding and Miss Jennings taking part. Miss Spalding, Mr. Ryan, and Mr. Albert were called upon to give explanations.

A motion was made to reconsider the action of yesterday relating to the time of holding the next Institute. Carried. By resolution it was agreed to leave the matter to the Comty Superintendent, having confidence in his judgment.
