CRIME.

In almost every paper we receive we find a record of some horrible crime committed either by burglars, robbers or murderers. Our own county is not clear of the miscreants who prowl about the whole country seeking to fill their pockets with plunder. On Sunday evening, the 24th ult., the store room of Morgan Bell, located at Gray's Old Stand in Richhill township, was broken open and several hundred dollars worth of goods stolen therefrom. Suspicion was directed against a young man named Wm. Owen, who was lurking about the county in different localities, and he was arrested and brought before Justice Webb of this borough, who committed him to the county Jail. Subsequently, through the perseverance of Justice Webb, the goods were found secreted in a wood near Wm. McClintock's farm, and restored to their owner. The culprit then made a confession of the theft, and wanted to have the court pass a sentence upon him, but as the grand jury had broken up before his arrest, he could not be indicted here, and as the sequel will prove very likely for a long while, if he keeps aloof from this county during the last week, the Sheriff having occasion to admit the prisoner outside of his cell, the culprit gave him leg bail. He was closely pursued for some distance, but proved too fleet for his pursuers, and he is still at large. He carries with him a soldier's discharge certificate, but by some, it is considered a forged one. Our citizens and business men should be on the alert at the present time, for scoundrels of this description.

COURT.

The Court was setting a few days during the past two weeks, but very little business was done in consequence of the sickness of R. W. Downey, Esq., one of the leading Attorneys of our borough, whose cases were all held over until next term. In the original calendar no cases were tried, which speaks well for the morals of the county.

OUR BOROUG.

The borough of Waynesburg wants 100 more houses built at the present time. There is a constant demand for the best quality of lumber, and it is not likely that the town will be able to supply the demand. The lumber men who wish to do business here should look to it.

In a communication published in the Republican some weeks ago, suggesting the call of a convention for the purpose of forming an association with a view to erecting a monument to the memory of the Greene County soldiers, I proposed to be one of 60 persons to raise \$300 dollars in Wayne tp. to appropriate to that purpose. I am now prepared to guarantee that Wayne tp. will furnish her \$300 providing the other townships will each do the same.

The Emperor of Brazil has appointed a "Board of Health" to investigate and decide what proprietary remedies should be admitted into the country and what excluded. ODD FELLOWS PROCESSION.

The Odd Fellows' Celebration yesterday (Tuesday) was considered a very decided success. The procession was formed at the Court House about 10 o'clock and numbered 212 in full regalia. After marching the usual rounds, witnessed by many hundreds of the citizens, doors and windows, they convened at the stand erected in Adams' orchard, where they were appropriately and ably addressed by the Rev. Wm. Reeves, D. D. A splendid band of music, led by Prof. Stoy, accompanied the procession and added materially to the display on that occasion. The day was favorable and the affair passed off pleasantly.

NEW YORK GOLD MARKET.
New York, September 30.—Gold stronger. Among sellers it is expected that the large payments next week of about 5-20 Coupons will check the upward tendency. The quotations this morning ranged at 146 1/4-1/2. The payment on account of 3-20 Coupons, from Monday to last evening, was \$1,250,000.

OIL CITY REPORT.
September 28.—The market ruled firm until the commencement of this week. It is now somewhat excited and prices have advanced. 1,000 bbls for October delivery, were sold on the Erie Fair, yesterday for \$3 50 per bbl.—The demand continues brisk, and large amounts are being advanced.

NEW YORK DRY GOODS TRADE.
The market for domestic goods has been somewhat excited, and prices have materially advanced, notwithstanding the market is very uncertain. The firmness in the views of holders has hitherto given way at the first withdrawal of buyers from market, though the stocks have been so low, and the probability of any speedy augmentation very remote, and their reappearance in market buyers have been the signal for excitement, and a general advance of values of all goods. There has been no stability to the market, and the prices current on one day have afforded no criterion for the next.

OIL IN GREENE COUNTY.

Since the fever to get rich fast has somewhat abated, would it not be reasonable and rational, for those who really feel it a pride and duty to develop fully and honestly, the resources of the oil wealth in our county, to go to work systematically, to accomplish that object. For one, I believe there is an abundance of oil in all parts of our county, but I do not believe it can be had by boring 5 or 600 feet. I firmly believe that no well at that depth is a fair test. Let us have fewer companies, but stronger ones—Let them be organized by men who can afford to subscribe what can be lost, provided there is a loss, with a capital sufficient to bore to the depth of at least 1000 to 1200 feet and then if the failure is made, we, at least, will have the satisfaction of having our lands fairly tested.—Let us have heavier and better engines which can do the work, and practical, scientific men to direct them and their experience will be of real value to the community. Then we will learn the value of our land, but not till this is done will the oil wealth in this region be known or appreciated. Speculation has had its day, now is the time to improve upon it. Because few have gone to the depth of 3 or 400 feet and become discouraged, that is no reason it should remain undeveloped.

MONETARY & COMMERCIAL.

NATIONAL CURRENCY.

WASHINGTON, September 30.
During the week ending to-day \$1,729,750 in National currency was issued to the banks, making the total amount now in circulation \$191,311,480. In the same period nearly eight millions of certificates of indebtedness were redeemed at the Treasury.

The receipts from Internal Revenue to-day amounted to nearly two millions of dollars.—The receipts from this source for the quarter ending to-day were \$63,729,419.

The payment of November coupons in gold Friday, at the office of the United States Assistant Treasurer in Philadelphia, amounted to fifty-three thousand dollars. The entire payment on the same account at New York up to the close of business on Thursday, that is for four days, was about eight hundred and fifty thousand dollars, a sum considerably smaller than the amount paid in on account of customs. It is this demand, probably, that so stiffens the gold premium, and in the hope of a further rise in gold keeps the collection of the November coupons back.

PHILADELPHIA PETROLEUM MARKET.

September 30.—Petroleum.—The demand continues active, and the tendency of prices is still upward. Sales of 2,000 bbls Crude at 33 cents, refined, at 41 cents for free, and 27 1/2 cts for bonded.
