MANAGEMENT OF COLTS.

management of a colt to insure a good and gentle horse, a few suggestions from one who has had some experience in the matter may not be out of place. Every farmer who is engaged in rearing young horses, should commeuce early to handle them; and for this purpose, a halter of the proper size should be procured, so that the colt may be It is unwise to suffer the colt to run until it is three or four years old before it is taught even the first lessons. When it becomes necessary to work

the dam, especially when plowing, the colt should be haltered, and tied where it will be convenient to loose it and let it suck, say three or four times during the day. By this means; the colt will case when it runs at will.
