DEATH OF A CENTENABIAN .- On the 8th inst., in this place, one PENDY MILES familiarly known in this neighborhood as "Old Punny," died. This woman was born the slave of James Seaton, who gave her to his son in law John Boreman. the first clerk of the Court in Greene County, and the grandfather of the present Governor of W. Va. She was manumitted by Mr. Boreman for "her faithful services and kindness towards his children" in the year 1814, which is recorded among the first records of this county. She has lived here from that time until her decease, but has for a long time been dependent upon the charity of our citizens for her support ---Having outlived the eldest of our aged Harry White, Pittsburgh, Pa. residents nothing definite is known conberning her exact age, but it is generally thought she was near the advanced period of 105 years, and has lived a devout christian during her life.
