DEATH OF A CENTENARIAN.—On the 8th inst., in this place, one PERRY MILES familiarly known in this neighborhood as "Old Patsy," died. This woman was born the slave of James Seaton, who gave her to his son in law John Boreman, the first clerk of the Court in Greene County, and the grandfather of the present Governor of W. Va. She was manumitted by Mr. Boreman for her faithful services and kindness towards his children in the year 1814, which is recorded among the first records of this county. She has lived here from that time until her decease, but has for a long time been dependent upon the charity of our citizens for her support. Having outlived the eldest of our aged residents nothing definite is known concerning her exact age, but it is generally thought she was near the advanced period of 105 years, and has lived a devout christian during her life.

JUNE MEETING.—This annual meeting came off last Sunday on Ruff's Creek. There was not such a general cleaning out of vehicles and conveyances in this town as heretofore, but we learn that quite a large number of people were in attendance.

GOLD MINING IN GREENE COUNTY.—Among the passengers going up on the steamer "Chiotina" last Friday was Mr. Charles B. Seidel, Superintendent of operations, for the Amber Gold Mining Company, of Philadelphia, who goes to the Keener farm, five miles from Greensboro, for the purpose of developing the mineral resources of that region. The company was organized some time since for the purpose of boring for oil, and for the depth of 600 feet struck a vein of gold quartz three feet in thickness, specimens of which, on being tested, yielded eighty dollars per pound. Consequently it was determined to sink a shaft six feet by twelve. Even if gold should not be found in paying quantities, the project may develop other success of

mineral wealth, and will at least satisfy us as to what the deep foundations of the western part of the State are composed of. The capital stock of the Company is \$350,000, and it has a working capital of \$150,000, in shares of one dollar each.

Groceries—Coffee, prime Rio at 24 to 29. Sugars steady, at 12 1/2 to 14 1/2 for brown, as to quality; 17 1/2 for crushed; 16 1/2 for 'A' Coffee, and 16 for 'B' ditto. Porto Rico Molasses firm at 85 to 87 for strictly prime, and Rangoon Rice is quoted at 10 1/2 to 11.
GRAIN—Wheat, Spring at \$2.25—Corn is steady at 75; 4 ears Shelled, in elevator, at 80, and 1 do prime yellow at 82. Oats at 51, and 3 3/4 bush for store at 58. Barley is quoted at 90 to 91 for good to prime Spring. Sales of Rye at \$1, and Buckwheat at \$2.25.
FLOUR—Regular sales from store at \$10 to 11 for Spring Wheat; \$11 1/2 for half Spring and half Winter; and 12 1/2 for all Winter.
PROVISIONS—Bacon is firm, and some holders are asking in advance. We quote at 14 1/2 for Shoulders; 17 1/2 for Ribbed Sides and 23 1/2 for Canvassed Sugar Cured Hams. Lard quiet but unchanged, at 22 to 23.
POTATOES—Quiet at \$1.15 to 1.20 per bush, and \$3 to 3.50 per bbl. Sales of some 200 bush prime Peach Blows, in lots, at 3 1/2.
BUTTER—Prime Roll may be quoted at 29 to 30.
EGGS—Demand fair at 18 to 20.
HAY—Is scarce and firm, at \$25 to 30 per ton.

BOSTON WOOL MARKET.
June 9.—There is a continued good demand for this staple, which promises to hold out as long as there is any old wool left upon the market. This will not be very long, however, at the present rate of consumption, as there are very few desirable lots, of either domestic fleece or pulled, remaining in the hands of the trade. Receipts from the interior, excepting small parcels of pulled wool, have almost entirely fallen off.
Sales of Domestic for the week foot up some 750,000 lbs., at a range of 45a to 70c for the various grades of pulled.—Ohio medium and fine at 60a65c; Ohio and Pennsylvania choice and double extra at 6572c outside rate for small lots.

Baltimore Cattle Market.
BALTIMORE, June 7.—Beef Cattle.—The offerings during the past week were 613 head, against 1054 head previous week. Prices to-day ranged as follows, viz: Common at \$6 to 7.50; and prime beef at \$8 to 9 per 100 lbs, with a few at prices a shade higher. The market closed very dull, with a downward tendency.
Sheep.—The supply this week was good, but owing to a demand in Philadelphia prices have been stiffened up.—Sales were made at 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 cents per lb gross.
Hogs.—The supply in market has been good, and sales made at \$13.25 to 14 per 100 lbs net—showing an advance of 10c or 15c on the inside figure.
