MILKING AND BUTTER MAKING.

The judicious farmer will commence the dairy season with his cows in good GO heart, sufficiently provided with flesh to meet easily the drafts which the milking season will make upon them. Where this precaution has been neglected, the result will be an indifferent yield of milk now, and an early drying up in autumn GEO. E. MINOR & CO While the calves are permitted to feed ficely from the udder ther is little trouble in extracting all the milk from it, but when the weaning time comes, many cows are viciously retentive, greatly to the annoyance of the milker, and to the detrument of the dairy products. In these cases, it is poor policy to get into a passion involving club law; on the contrary, mildness should be used, and a friendly relation established between the animal and the milker, as soon as may be. This once done, no more trouble need be apprehended on this score. *

In milking, cleanliness should be a the LADIES to the largest lot of prime consideration. This involves proper personal allation, as well as a suitable preparation of the udder of the cow for the milking process. - We have known persons to milk cows in a condition so filthy as to render the contents of RIBBONS, the milk pail scarcely fit to throw before swine. Such persons have no conception of the luxury of pure milk. 'A good milker will not be in such a hurry to finish as to lose the better and productive portion. It is estimated that the last pint taken from a cow, well stripped, is equal to at least five of the market. Don't forget the place, at the first ones. Some make a practice of milking cows three times during the day-claining an increased product from the practice. This may be so, where cows are kept under shelterall the time, but when suffered to run at large, involving a driving up of the herd at mid day, the DREAD effect cannot be otherwise than deleterious. Milking twice a day-early in the morning, and in the cool of the evening -will be found the better plan; certain. ly the easier one, and probably, on the RINEHART & INGHRAM whole, quite as productive.

Before being put down, the milk should be rendered unmarketable. This should be done by a free use of the butter ladle instead of the hand, for, if no better, the use of the ladle has a more cleanly look. The tub to be used in packing down, should be well cleaned by a free use of scalding water. When properly prepared in this respect, the inside should be ed in this respect, the inside should be thoroughly rabbed over with fine salt, and the bottom covered over with a thin sell lower than any one in the place. Be sure to go to the right place, in coating of melted butter.

To preserve butter, simple rock salt is usually relied upon, but a composition pwlo of rulyerized sugar one part, salt- cupied by the Post One the whole beaten into a fine powderwill preserve the butter quite as well as pure rock salt, besides giving it a better flavor.

If a richer tinge than natural be desired, it can be supplied, without injury, by the use of carrot juice. Take clean carrots, fresh from the garden, it in season, grate them fine and press out the juice through a coarse linen cloth and mix ness by any other establishment in this part with the cream before churning. This improves the appearance of the butter without injuriously affecting the taste of it.
