SPARETHE WOODPECKERS. - As is well known, woodpeckers subsist principally upon the larvæ of the tree-beetles or borers, which they obtain by picking GO holes in the trunks and branches of the trees, and thrusting in their long barbed tongues and drawing the vermin from their lurking places. Some of these woodpeckers have at times been regarded as injurious, from the fact that they are called, in some localities, sap-suckers, from the mistaken opinion that they suck the sap and eat the soft inner bark of some of the trees.

A HIST -It is well known by all haymakers, that the soles of boots or shoes, in the hot dry weather during having, become smooth as glass, and full as uncertain for a foothold, as well as dangerous on the top of a load, or in ascending and descending the mows. Now, to remedy this evil, I take the soles from a pair of cast off rubber shoes, and tack them to the bottoms of my boots. Since this has been my practice. I have at all times known where to find my feet when I put them down. A capital hint and we commend it to our readers.

TO REMOVE STUMPS. A correspondent of the Rural Register states that Mr. John Barnes, of Baltimore, removed a troublesome stump from near his house follows: 'Last fall, with an inch auger, he bored a hole in the centre of the stump, ten inches deep, and into it put about half a pound of oil of vitriol, and corked the hole up tight. This spring, the whole stump and roots, extending through all their ramificationss were so rotten that they were easily eradicated.' If true the above would be a cheap

method of removing stumps. The sulphuric acid can be bought for about five cents per pound!

AGRICULTURAL IMPROVEMENT. The Working Farmer says on this subject:

"Improvement in modes of culture means simply that the land shall be underdrained, if we'; plowed deep, subsoiled, and cultivated thoroughly, so as to keep the weeds down, the surface of the ground constantly stirred, and open to the ingress of the air and dews: The atmosphere is a storehouse of mois ture, carbon, ammonia, and other vital elements of crops, but it cannot penetrate a baked, closely packed soil, in order to produce those changes in its chemical condition, without which the wonderfel . processes of plant growth are impossible. But if the surface and subsoil are loosened by deep cultivation and disturbed frequently during the season of vegetation, the air circulates freely among the particles of soil; water, the solvent of all the organic and inorganic constituents of crops, is supplied in proper quantities to produce the right conditions for the free appropriation of plant food. Thus the improved tillage of the soil develops an sell lower than any one in the place.
