"Speed the plow and speed the harrow: Peace and plenty send abroad, Better far the spode and barrow; Than the cannon and the sword."

TURNIPS-PURPLE TOPS. From the first of July to the first of August, turnips may be put in. I prefer the Purple Tops. They may succeed GO RIGHT IN other early crops; as onions, peas, green corn, early potatoes, &c. Superphosphate of lime willbe found an excellent substitute for barn manure in the cultivation of most turnips, not excepting even the rata baga In putting to this CEO. E. MINOR & CO crop, the sowing should immediately succeed the harrowing, and be completed while the soil is moist and fresh to insure the germination of the seed -Drilling is preferable to broadcasting, as it enables the operator to adopt a more sortment of thorough system of after culture, and to keep the soil in a condition the most favorable to the rapid and healthy development of the plants. Any light land will prove congenial to this crop. . Bone dust is an excellent stimulant, and possesses the advantage of being cheap as well as efficient. These turnips constitute a most excellent feed for cows and young cattle, and when rasped and mixed with chaffed hay, haulm, cornstalks or straw, enable the feeder to effect a very important saving in the expense of keeping them through the winter. Boiled and mixed with corn or RIBBONS, cob meal, they also furnish a most healthy and invigorating ailment for store hogs Sheep, likewise, are very fond of them -When fed to these animals they should be cut fine, and fed with a little salt. I have known excellent crops of tur

nips raised among Indian corn, the seed being sown after or just before the last dressing. The hoe will cover the seed sufficiently deep, and as evenness of dissemination is not of essential importance, its action will supersede the necessity of using the rake. Soaking the seed for twenty-four hours before committing it to the soil, in house lye, or urine from the stables, and rolling it in a mixture composed of equal parts of flour of brimstone, plaster of Paris, and pulverized charcoal, will be found not only greatly to facilitate the process of germination, but tend powerfully to protect the same from the ravages of the fly, and other alligorous depredators which too often prey upon the plants .- An occasional dressing of the plants after they are fully developed, with the same mixture, will be found highly salutary, and secure a rapid and healthy development.-Poudrette and guano have also been used with ezcellent success in the cultivation of the turnip, but an old pasture land, recently broken up, no manure is necessary except a slight dressing of gypsum or good ashes.—Germantown Telegraph.

TO DESTROY THE FOTATOE BUG,

A correspondent of the Prairie Farmer thinks he has found a perfect remedy for the potato bug, viz: One gallon of coal oil to one barrel of water mixed well together. Sprinkle lightly upon the potato vines cut of a waterspot or with a small brush, and they will disappear. On which the editor remarks: "If our readers would bear in mind that as insects breathe through spiracles, oil is more disastrous to them than any. thing else, they would have the c'ew to the saving of the most of their trees and vines. Bark lice, scale insects, turnip flies, caterpillars, flea beetles, and in fact. all insects which can be reached are destroyed by it. Any oil will do, but it must be kept stirred so as not to remain on the top of water, and for this feason a brush or syringe is preferable to a watering can. This mixture is also quite beneficial to plants, as is manifest from of the State. Parties wishing the healthy start they take after its application."

MULES VS. HORSES.

In the warm latitudes the mule will perform labor that would kill a horse, while in the temperate he is superior to the horse as a drudge. His cost of keep ing is not more than helf that of a horse, while his years of labor are more than twice as many. The longevity of the mule is well known. A gentleman visiting the West Indies saw a mule at work in a field, having then attained the age of forty years. Owing to their hardiness and cheapness of keep, they are becoming a great favorite on the rice and cotton plantations of the south and west. So far back as 1850 there were 65,000 of these animals in Kentucky alone.

WHEAT CROP.-Farmers say through Wisconsin there never was a prospect for a better wheat crop than at present. It looks now as though the wheat crop would be all that was desired, the wet state of the ground keeping the chinch bug away .- Milwaukee Wisconsin.
