CONVENTION OF SUPERINTENDENTS.—A call has been issued for a convention of the Superintendents of the Common Schools of the State of Pennsylvania, to meet in Harrisburg on the 4th of December. Important changes in the school law will be proposed for the consideration of the convention, providing for an increase of the minimum length of the annual school term; the establishment of uniformity of text book in each county; the support of county institutions by public appropriations; the abolition of 'provisional certificates'; the creation of district superintendents; the enlargement of the number of the branches of study required by law.
